

LLOYD CAPTURES ORPHEUM HONORS

Catchy Songs and Character Pictures Make a Real Hit at Local Theatre.

If Lee Lloyd did not stop the show last evening and take about all the honors of the new bill at the Orpheum this week, it was not the fault of the audience. Mr. Lloyd is assisted at the piano by Jay Roberts, who is something of an artist himself when it comes to playing rag and his chimes on the piano are wonderfully real and beautiful. Mr. Lloyd's character pictures are full of the rich touch that makes them both artistic and tremendously popular.

The big feature and novelty act of the bill is "Cheyenne Days" with Lucille Mulhall, Art Borden and Otto Kline in the exhibitions of bronco busting and expert roping. A number of cow boys in full regalia lend realism to the act which is replete with sensations, flying ropes and bucking bronchos. Miss Mulhall and Mr. Borden do some astounding stunts with the rope and the act closes with Wampus, an outlaw bronc, as the star. Messrs. Parker, Horsfall and Blaucoini offer an artistic and pleasing musical act with their flutes. Their selections, ranging from classics to popular, are beautifully rendered with many brilliant variations and their turn was decidedly popular.

An act which won high favor was the club swinging work of the Mabelle Fonda company, two women and two men. The setting is attractive, costume good and the work cleverly executed with good effects.

Klein Brothers and Sybil Brennan, late stars of "In Panama," offer an act of musical comedy with a little patter and bits of dancing, none of which is particularly new nor startling.

The Trio Du Gede opened the bill with a mediocre gymnastic act in which the comedy is not the best feature.

Mac M. Barnes, Louise Reming & Co. offer a sorry attempt at sketch in which the main play for favor seems to be made in contrasting sizes and rough house work.

"JACKPOT" STORY IS CONFIRMED BY NEW WITNESSES

attorney's office should lend itself to a scheme to further intimidate these witnesses and prevent the truth from coming out. You will remember that Detective Burns was forced to get a man to act for two years as chauffeur for Ruef before he could get the evidence of graft in San Francisco.

"Now we find that Maher had been down through the north and since this investigation started. One of the witnesses testified that Maher threatened to shoot him, and Maher has threatened me. Mr. Lightner was a witness to his exhibition of temper against me."

"I didn't threaten you," broke in Maher. "I said you was a thief, and said I would prove it by the records of the courts."

"He did threaten me," resumed Fouts. "Mr. Lightner there heard what took

place, and was forced to tell him to behave and be decent."

Fouts called on Lightner to confirm his statement, and the county commissioner nodded his head in assent.

No Evidence Against Maher. Judge Cleeton suggested that Maher and Fouts should discuss their difficulties in some other place. The judge further said that so far no testimony had been offered to connect Maher with the alleged jackpot said to have been delivered to Perkins.

"Unless you can connect Maher with this alleged graft," said Judge Cleeton, "the court will discontinue this investigation. The grand jury is in session, and can consider the testimony so far as it relates to other persons. It is Maher only that the court is interested in. We have other work to do, and cannot sit here day after day to hear irrelevant testimony."

Fouts inquired if the court found no testimony at all to connect Maher with the jackpot story. Judge Cleeton replied that he considered that Maher had been connected with it. "If the court is satisfied, I am," replied Fouts. "But the court will realize this sort of a case must be established by degrees. The first thing is to establish the existence of the jackpot, then to show the circumstances which indicate a conspiracy between Perkins and Maher. We have learned that common rumor among newspaper men and police officers named Perkins and Maher."

Was Other Evidence. "I have other evidence to offer. There is another affair besides this \$300 jackpot, and I have another witness who contributed to the \$300 sack. I expect to connect Maher further with this graft."

Judge Cleeton said he is willing to keep on investigating until next December if evidence is offered to connect Maher with the alleged graft. He also stated that if Perkins desires to go ahead and be heard in his own defense, the court will grant him that privilege. Perkins' attorney said nothing to indicate whether this offer will be accepted.

Henry Libert, the insurance man who talked with Perrot at Seaside Thursday, said there was a general conversation between himself, Perrot, Mathis, and a man named Collins, who is employed by Perrot at Seaside, while the four were strolling along the beach and cottages. In his conversation Perrot said the jackpot story was true, but he thought it should not have been told about his connection with it. He said he had denied it when visited by Collier and Perkins because he wanted to keep out of trouble.

Perry Testifies. By the testimony of A. H. Perry, a reporter for the Oregonian, the court found how the graft charges against Maher and Perkins started. Perry contradicted the contention made in some quarters that Fouts or the Burns detective agency had started the ball rolling.

Perry said he started to dig into graft rumors under instructions from his newspaper. He said general rumor was that jackpots were being raised. This report came from newspaper men and police officers. He mentioned Captain Moore, Captain Buey, Detective Day, Patman Black and others. Bailey suggested he see Des Camps, and when he talked to Des Camps, the latter freely admitted the raising of a "jackpot," which he said was for Perkins and Maher.

Perry then went ahead and arranged for meeting in Des Camps' saloon, to which several outsiders were invited, among them G. E. Constable, of the Burns agency. He asked Constable to go, he said, because he wanted reliable witnesses to what took place. At the

next meeting Fouts appeared, having been invited by Constable.

Ferry said the rumors he had heard of north end graft dealt mainly with the name of Perkins. He could not recollect that Maher had been mentioned, up to the time he went to the Frenchman. He denied that he went to Des Camps' place by direction of Captain Bailey. Clark evidently desiring to build up the theory that enmity of Bailey toward Maher or Perkins was responsible, and that Bailey sent the reporter to see Des Camps.

Perry promised to supply the court with a list of names from which further information about graft may be had. The inquiry was adjourned to an indefinite date, awaiting the return of Attorney Clark from an out of town trip, and probably will not be resumed before the middle of next week.

Mrs. C. A.: You are ruining your hair using soap for shampoo purposes. The alkali dries out the scalp, and causes dandruff. Use a mild hair soap. For your case, I know of nothing better than a plain cantharox shampoo. This makes an abundance of rich, penetrating lather that thoroughly cleanses and invigorates. You will find on using this that the hair dries evenly and quickly and that the scalp is soft and supple. You can get cantharox at the drug store, and a teaspoonful dissolved in a cup of hot water is enough for a good shampoo.

Eva: It is distressing to have a shiny, muddy skin but that can be corrected if you dissolve four ounces of Epsom salt in one half pint of water and add two teaspoonfuls of glycerine. When cold apply to the skin and rub lightly until dry. A few times using cleanses the skin of impurities and banishes freckles and tan. You will find this better than powder, as it is invisible when on and does not rub off or spot from perspiration.

Nell: Don't worry about the fuzz on your chin. To rid the skin of the objectionable growth, get an ounce of delatone at the drug store and with water mix some into a paste, then apply to hairy surface and after two or three minutes rub off and wash the skin carefully. While delatone costs a dollar an ounce, it seldom requires a second application to completely remove superfluous hairs.

M.: Expressive eyes never lack in brilliancy, yet to keep them so, it is necessary to give them proper care and attention. Whenever your eyes ache or grow tired, use an eye-cream, made by dissolving an ounce of crystals in a pint of cold water, few drops in each eye twice daily quickly relieves the smart or ache and aside from strengthening the eyes, gives to them a remarkable brilliancy and sparkle.

HILL WILL NOT DISCUSS HIMSELF AS CANDIDATE

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 22.—Samuel Hill, good roads advocate, will leave shortly on a six months' tour of Europe, where he will study the splendid highways of Great Britain, France, Germany and other countries. He left Seattle last night for his country home at Maryhill, where he will make preparations for his long trip. His house on East Highland drive will be closed until his return.

It is Mr. Hill's plan to return to this state after six months, with a big fund of information concerning the good roads movement and to take an active part in the campaign for the election of governor.

Mr. Hill would not discuss whether he would be a candidate for governor, but said that upon his return he would be prepared to take an active part in the campaign. His chief interest lies in the securing for this state of a system of highways which will compare favorably with the splendid roads of European countries.

Mr. Hill was a delegate to the international good roads congress which met in Paris three years ago, and after the sessions he traveled over the principal roads of France, England and Germany by automobile. He will go back this time to cover a wider scope

of country and to make a more detailed study of the highways.

It is likely that while in Europe Mr. Hill will pay a visit to King Albert of Belgium. When the king was the crown prince he and Mr. Hill were friends in Paris. It was Prince Albert's intention to visit Mr. Hill in Seattle two years ago, but the duties of state made it necessary for him to cancel the trip to the United States. Since Albert ascended the throne of Belgium he has written Mr. Hill, informally inviting him to call when he next visited Belgium.

RAY, ROGUE RIVER ELECTRIC SELLS TO SISKIYOU PEOPLE

concern of its kind in the west, generally accepted as a "trust," is back of the Siskiyou company. This is denied by Colonel Ray, who is the chairman of the board of directors of that company. Some also profess to see the hand of James J. Hill in the deal, but this apparently has no foundation.

Deny Electric Railroad Theory. Representatives of the purchasing company say they will proceed with the present plans of the Rogue River Electric company and complete the power house now under course of construction

at Prospect. Several extensions are also to be made. They deny any intention of building electric roads throughout this section at the present time. They state that they will extend the present lines to cover all outlying districts in their territory, giving each settlement a supply of electric current for power and light purposes.

The Prospect plant is valued at \$2,500,000 and the Rogue River Electric company plant at \$800,000. The deal gives the Siskiyou company a monopoly of the water power resources of northern California and southern Oregon.

When construction work at present under way is completed, a total of 80,000 horsepower, at low water, will be developed with 800 miles of high tension wires, 400 miles of which has a voltage exceeding 20,000, extending from Grants Pass to Klamath Falls, Or., and south to Redding, Cal.

Colonel Frank H. Ray is also vice president of the American Tobacco company and chairman of the board of directors of the Western Power company.

To Seek Uniformity in Food Laws. Duluth, Minn., Aug. 22.—The problem of how best to bring about the much needed uniformity of the food laws of the various states of the Union was the main topic of discussion at the meeting of the association of state and national food departments, which was held here

today. Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, who is one of the strongest supporters of the uniformity movement, was present at the meeting and delivered an address, in which he explained the existing conditions and pledged himself to do everything in his power to bring about uniformity of food legislation.
