

INVESTIGATION OF CHARGES OF GRAFT MAY BE DELAYED

Course to Be Pursued Problematical; Suggested That Feroct Might Be Indicted on Charge of Perjury.

What the grand jury will do toward the investigation of graft charges in the north end remains a matter of conjecture. District Attorney Cameron is non-committal, and says he does not know just when the grand jury will "get around" to the graft question. He is apparently undecided as to whether anything should be done.

One course suggested is the indictment of some of the Frenchmen of the north end on a perjury charge. If that course is taken, the most likely subject appears to be Armand Feroct, who swore in a statement to Deputy District Attorney Collier and F. L. Perkins that he knew nothing of a sack he was said by others to have collected, and two witnesses have since testified he acknowledged to them that he swore falsely.

Testimony Against Feroct.
Against Feroct could be marshaled the testimony of Henry Gallet, Tony Arnaud, Ferdinand Nesme, E. Binswanger and Ernest Benoit, each of whom has testified he delivered money to Feroct. Also the testimony of two witnesses, at least, that he has admitted collecting the sack since his sworn denial, and the testimony of Alex Methnier, who testified he overheard a conversation between Feroct and others in which Feroct said it was necessary to get \$100 by 10 o'clock that night to give Perkins, or there would be a big "holer" in the paper the next day. There is said to be one other witness to admissions by Feroct.

Another line of action would be to indict some of the Frenchmen on the charge of bribing an officer, since they have testified the money was raised to give to Perkins, and Perkins is a deputy sheriff. The only question that might arise would then be that the Frenchmen were probably ignorant that Perkins held an officer's star. They testified they raised the money for Perkins in his capacity as a newspaper reporter, thinking they could thereby prevent the publication of exposures of the north end.

Frank Minto, one of the men said by Arnaud to be a contributor to the alleged jackpot, followed the lead of Des Camps, Donovan and Feroct by making a denial in a statement at Vancouver, Wash., last Monday night. The statement was taken by Deputy District Attorney Collier in the presence of Perkins, who also accompanied Collier when the Feroct statement was taken.

Didn't Contribute.
In the course of his statement he said he never contributed to a jackpot, and the first he knew about it was when he read it in the newspapers. He said he left Portland because it was none of his affair and he did not want to "get mixed up in it."

Minto also stated that he had seen Perkins and County Detective Maher in the north end together once or twice, the last time about three weeks ago. He said he and Perkins have been friends for a long time, and he asked Perkins if the latter had heard anything about somebody trying to job him out of his place. Perkins said he had heard so, and some of the north end Frenchmen were behind it.

Minto said he heard reports were being circulated that he had supported Simon for mayor. They were trying to get Rushlight "sore at him," he thought. He said he supported Rushlight, but controlled only his own vote. After he and Perkins had talked awhile, he said, he told Perkins that some folks down there were trying to do him harm.

Minto's Affidavit.
"He asked me what it was," reads the Minto affidavit, "and I told him, and I believe about that time, or two or three days before he dropped in there, one of them Frenchmen came down there, and that night I believe the Telegram gave them quite a roasting, and they were all pretty sore, and he was down there buying a few drinks. He told me then he says, 'The only way we will get any rest in the north end is to get rid of Perkins and of Paddy Maher. We are going to frame up something on them and get rid of them.'"

"Did he say what he would frame up?"
"No, he didn't say. I told him that is kind of dangerous business to be doing."

"Who was that Frenchman?"
"Tony Arnaud."

This statement by Minto is the first

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 23.—General denial was made today by Oakland officials of the Southern Pacific company that orders have been issued for a sweeping reduction in force of all departments. It is freely admitted that reductions are contemplated but the cause for the reduction is given as slack business following the heavy summer traffic.

In the local shops 600 men are affected by the order reducing the working time from six to five days a week and from nine to eight hours.

Vote Supports Plan.

Secretary Chesley R. Perry of the treasurer and the auditing committee were received, showing prosperous advance and serving as basis for an aggressive extension policy built to more cities of the United States and into foreign countries.

The delegates to the national convention will separate tomorrow, some of them going to San Francisco and Los Angeles, where special entertainment has been arranged, part to Tacoma, where an expedition to Mount Rainier, Tacoma, where further entertainment is planned. Resolutions adopted and comments by delegates expressed appreciation for entertainment given by the Portland Rotary club.

The association was divided into seven sections. The general committee elected as national directors Eugene C. McCan of New York, William G. Stearns of Tacoma and G. C. Meade of Philadelphia. These will serve from 1911 to 1914.

Other directors are: 1910-1912, F. L. Clark, Boston; C. W. Hill, Los Angeles; A. R. Stafford, St. Louis; 1910-1913, William J. Bovard, New Orleans; Lee Bettler, Kansas City; F. L. Thresher, Minneapolis.

Round Table Discussion.
The resolutions committee met last night and completed its report. The presidents of all clubs held an important session, telling how best to conduct club business. All club secretaries met in a round table discussion of administrative business. The board of directors passed on the report of the auditing committee. The lawyers, members of the association, met and when they adjourned at 2 o'clock this morning had decided that it is ethical for lawyers to be Rotarians and receive business from fellow members. The San Francisco delegates gave a general reception to all visiting and resident Rotarians, and had as guests many prominent in local society circles.

A report on conduct of clubs was given this morning by President Collins of the Minneapolis club, which was so practical that its publication and forwarding to all clubs was ordered.

Salem, Or., Aug. 23.—Out of 50 men at the penitentiary subject to parole 10 were recommended for parole and six recommended for executive clemency by the parole board which met yesterday. Contrary to an impression which is abroad to some extent that men are readily turned loose from the Oregon penitentiary as soon as their minimum term expires, great caution is being exercised by the parole board.

Owing to press of business affairs J. W. Minto has tendered his resignation as a member of the board and his successor will be appointed by Governor West. Another member of the board, J. M. Lynn, a local hop dealer, is also finding difficulty at the present time to attend board meetings. Superintendent C. W. James is the third member of the board. At the meeting of the board yesterday 25 names referred by Governor West for recommendations were considered and six recommended at fit subjects for trust and responsibility.

BOY RUN DOWN BY AUTO IS IMPROVING

The 5-year-old son of Mrs. Helen Tully of 178 Ella street, who was run down by an automobile on Washington street near Twenty-first at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, feasted easily last night, and strong hopes are entertained for his recovery, although he will not be out of danger for several days.

W. W. Allison, a machinist of the Nease-McCarty company, 19 years of age, was driving the machine which struck the little boy. Allison was driving east on Washington and turned to the left of a streetcar in order to pass

it. The boy started to cross the street in the middle of the block, and according to Allison, stepped from behind a dairy wagon directly in front of the auto and so close that Allison could not avoid striking him. Allison claims he was, driving at a speed of about 15 miles, and that the accident happened so quickly he had no idea how or where the boy was struck.

Allison tried for a few minutes to find the boy's parents, and failing in this, and realizing the boy was seriously injured, he took him into the machine and hurried to the Good Samaritan-hospital, where Dr. J. O. C. Willey attended the boy. The injuries are especially serious about the head.

Allison refused to give his name at the hospital until Motorcycle Patrolman Evans appeared and arrested him. He was charged with assault and battery and was held by Judge Taswell on \$500 bail.
