

FLIMSY COACHES COLLAPSE LIKE CARDBOARD BOXES

Loss of Life in New York Railroad Wreck Laid Largely to Poor Construction of Passenger Cars.

(Special to The Journal.)
Albany, N. Y., Aug. 26.—Inspectors of the public service commission officially reported today that a defectively constructed rail caused the fatal wreck on the Lehigh Valley road at Manchester. The report states that the rail crumbled into 17 pieces.

Manchester, N. Y., Aug. 26.—Mangled and crushed out of nearly all semblance to humanity, 27 bodies lie today in the temporary morgue at Shortsville, and four are dead in Rochester as a result of the fatal Lehigh Valley railroad wreck near here.

In a temporary hospital here and in the relief hospital at Rochester are 38 more victims. Eight of them are fatally injured.

The terrific list of dead in the wreck is laid to the flimsy day coaches. Every one of those killed or seriously injured was riding in the unbraced wooden cars used for ordinary passengers. The occupants of the steel diner and the Pullmans were only bruised when the shock came, their cars resisting well, while the day coaches crumbled like cardboard, mangled and maiming nearly everyone who rode in them.

Sixteen undertakers worked all last night embalming the victims in an improvised morgue in the basement of a furniture store. Coroner Eiselein will conduct an inquest into the disaster Monday.

Among the identified dead most of whom are being identified by bits of jewelry and other personal effects, is D. M. Belt, a Los Angeles, Cal., A. H. V. man, who died in Rochester en route to a hospital.

It is believed today that a blow hole in one of the rails caused the wreck. Archibald Buchanan, supervisor of equipment for the New York state public service commission is in charge of the situation. His report, it is said, will lay the whole blame for the frightful death list at the door of the wooden car and the result in New York probably will be a command to the railroads that steel cars for all grades of passengers must be provided without delay.

The scene of the wreck is one of the worst spots along the whole line of the Lehigh Valley road. If the train had left the rails 100 feet in either direction from where it did, the coaches would not have been run over the trestle and probably the loss of life would not have been one tenth of that which today has filled this and surrounding towns with dead and wounded.

CRAZY WOMAN? NYMPH? NEITHER! ONLY BATHER

Investigation by the matron showed that a San Francisco girl, comparatively a stranger in San Bernardino, had walked along the banks of the creek, and decided to have a swim. Everything was fine until mischievous boys stole her clothing. Ranchers provided necessary apparel for a proper entrance into the city.

GREEKS' BANKER LEAVES WITH THEIR COIN; STAYS

Medford, Or., Aug. 26.—There is a walling and a nymphet in Greek town today following the failure to return of Chris Kall, erstwhile "king" of the colony, who took with him more than \$700, owned by his Greek compatriots. A warrant has been issued and the authorities are now on Kall's track, the members of the Greek colony contributing to a fund for the hunt.

Kall has long been the financial agent of the local Greeks. He knew more of American customs than most of his fellow countrymen and they accordingly elected him as sort of business agent. He secured them work, treated the employers and acted as a savings bank. Last Friday he left for the short trip.

This is the second financial agent to leave the district with Greek money.

LINOTYPER SITS IN LYE; NOW HE LIES

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OREGON NO LONGER PAYS MONEY FOR TIPS

Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—The outstanding Secretary of State Olcott's ultimatum declaring no more claims for tips would be allowed, many state officials persist in sending them in. Some have recently come in listed "tips" and some as "porter," ranging from 35 cents to \$1.25. All are promptly turned down by Olcott.

Other leaks are being stopped. One Oregon sheriff has been found constantly adding 5 cents to actual fare for prisoners brought to the state penitentiary. A prominent commission has just turned in a claim for \$100 for a monthly salary for an official which had already been paid.

WATER FILING DISPUTED ON SCENIC GROUNDS

Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—A struggle for the preservation of the beauty of Latourelle falls has been initiated here by the filing of a protest by R. A. Leiter, a Portland attorney against the state engineer's office granting to George W. Joseph and William H. Maffett the right to divert five cubic feet per second from Latourelle creek above the scenic falls. It is alleged the filing of Joseph and Maffett would take enough water from the stream completely to spoil the falls. The engineer's report on this point will be filed with the state engineer. Petitions will be filed to have the claims of Joseph and Maffett referred to the board of control on the grounds that the diversion of the water for power and irrigation purposes would be a menace to public welfare. The board after full consideration has the power to decide the right to divert water if it sees fit.

VEHICLE TAX CASE TO GO TO SUPREME COURT

Following a refusal by Judge McGinn to grant an injunction against the city officers to prevent enforcement of the vehicle tax ordinance, it was announced yesterday that the case will be speedily carried to the state supreme court. State Senator Dan Kellner held a conference with Mayor Rushlight yesterday morning and it was agreed the case should be hastened, Kellner being one of those fighting the tax.

Judge McGinn resorted to the unusual expedient of entering a demurrer on his behalf when the case came up for argument Thursday afternoon. The city had been cited to appear to show cause why an injunction should not be granted, but the judge ordered short proceedings by announcing he would issue no injunction and would sustain the demurrer.

"But no demurrer has been filed in this case," suggested Attorney Ringo, representing the 50 or more complainants.

"Then I demur of my own volition," said the judge, and he directed a demurrer entered. The demurrer was ordered sustained.

Judge McGinn said he believed the whole matter should be taken to the supreme court to settle the question of constitutionality of the proposed tax on vehicles. He said that injunctions have been issued too frequently and should only be employed when there is no clear and adequate remedy at law. He said he would presume the city council was acting within its powers and the case could be carried up to the higher court.

This is the fourth ordinance the city has passed imposing a tax on vehicles. Each time the vehicle owners have filed suit and won, except one case. That was appealed to the supreme court and the city lost the appeal.

EUGENE BOND ISSUE, \$130,000, SELLS WELL

Eugene, Or., Aug. 26.—Morris Brothers of Portland were the successful bidders for the refunding issue of \$130,000 over a half dozen eastern companies. Bids for this issue and for the issue of \$57,000 water, light and power bonds were opened by the city council of Eugene Thursday. The latter issue will not be let until Monday. But one firm offered to take both issues of bonds. Morris Brothers offered a 5 per cent interest, with a premium of \$181.50. Other companies bidding for the \$130,000 bond issue were S. A. Keene & Co. of Chicago, offering 5 per cent and \$330 premium; E. H. Rolands & Sons, 5 per cent and \$105. On the two issues together was Wooten, McNear & Moore, offering 5 per cent on the larger issue and 4 per cent on the smaller and a total premium of \$1487. On the \$57,000 issue John Nye and Co. of Chicago offered 5 per cent and \$171 premium; Security Savings Bank & Trust company of Toledo, Ohio, 5 1/2 per cent and \$1251; and J. H. Causey & Co. of Denver, 5 per cent and \$230.

HOBOS OF SKY FOUND PLAYING AROUND IN NORTHERN HEAVENS

Almon B. Coe, an employee of the Oregon Canal company, living at 167 Whitaker street, following the announcement recently made of a meteor which would be visible last night, rose this morning at 2 a. m. and discovered it near the Northern Cross, north and a little west of the alpha star of the constellation Deneb. It is visible with a good pair of opera glasses and appears as a nebula, not particularly bright. Mr. Coe has a very powerful imported French telescope with which he could easily distinguish the phenomenon.

COLEMAN GETS \$17,240—SEATTLE COIN IN TWO DAYS

Clever Forger Travels to Puget Sound to Lift Some of Hillman's Quickly Gotten Fortune, and Succeeds.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 26.—J. L. Worthman of Grays Harbor, alias Frank H. Kimball, alias Joe Matthews, is in jail here accused of defrauding three large Seattle banks of \$17,240 yesterday. This money with \$5000 obtained from C. D. Hillman, convicted real estate dealer, was found in the prisoner's possession when he was arrested in Tacoma last night by local detectives and Pinkertons. It is said that Worthman has been traced over much of the western country and that he has obtained \$75,000 by fraudulent transactions.

A local banker yesterday told P. K. Ahern, local Pinkerton agent, that he had seen a man similar in appearance to Worthman's photo printed in a detective circuit. The suspect was traced to a local hotel, thence to Tacoma on the Interurban. With Detectives Adams and Peterson of Seattle, Worthman was arrested at the Tacoma hotel late last night. Officers broke the door, finding the suspect who made an unsuccessful effort to get away by the fire escape. In a suit case \$22,000 in currency was found also paraphernalia for starting and cancelling checks, and a supply of hair dye.

Thursday Worthman bought land from C. D. Hillman, giving in payment \$10,000 in checks on the American Exchange Bank, Dallas, Texas. He received the deed and \$5000 in money. Since Tuesday he cleaned up \$17,240 from local banks. Worthman had blanks in his possession showing Portland as objective point.

Worthman told the officers that while he was in Guthrie he read about Hillman's land methods and being out on bail came here. "I came to Seattle with one purpose, getting some of Hillman's money," said Worthman when arrested.

SAYS BRIDGE TENDER FAVORS THE GATZERT

A committee headed by O. G. Hughson has been appointed by the Rose City Park Improvement association to investigate complaints against the bridge tender favors the steamer Bailey Gatzert by opening the bridge when he hears the boat whistle for the steel bridge and long before it has reached the Burnside bridge on its way up the river. He is often in such a hurry, they say, that he does not give people a chance to get out from the draw but forces them to ride around with it. By opening the draw so quickly cars, vehicles and foot passengers are often kept waiting some time when there would be plenty of time for them to get across before the draw opened.

FIDGETY GIRLS ARE GIVEN SPECIAL COURSE

Madison, Wis., Aug. 26.—A course in resting is today a part of the curriculum of the University of Wisconsin, according to the University Bulletin which says that the study will be open to girls of nervous and "fidgety" temperaments.

At the attitude of the department of physical training that hundreds of young women of the over nervous type do not know how to conserve their energy and by nervous gestures, grimaces, etc., cause a serious drain on their nervous system. The "resting course" will be taught many manners of conservation of the nerves.

NAVAL MILITIA ROW UNRAVELED IN COURT

Samuel White, as an attorney for the defense, this morning appeared in the circuit court to protest against having himself and the other members of the board of inquiry into naval militia affairs characterized as "ignorant and inexperienced."

George S. Shepherd, who appeared in his own behalf as attorney in the suit he has brought to oust Captain J. J. Reynolds from command of the naval militia, defended the board of inquiry applied to White, to Albert J. Capron and Loren A. Bowman, the members of the board of inquiry. This board declared Shepherd had failed to use good judgment in the handling of the militia. Shepherd replied that the members of the board did not know enough about naval matters to tell whether he used good judgment or not.

While argued that shepherd's matter incorporated in Shepherd's complaint has no place there and should be stricken out. After hearing the views of the attorneys Judge McGinn took the matter under advisement.

MURDERER WEEMS NOT INSANE, GENERAL BELIEF

Colfax, Wash., Aug. 26.—The mental condition of Carl Weems, the self-confessed murderer of Leroy Cantrell is unchanged. Many are of the belief that Weems is not insane. About 3 a. m. he wakes the prisoners with his wild yelling. Four physicians examined Weems very thoroughly at the time of his arrest and no signs of insanity were noted.

Deputy Sheriff William Cole who was shot through the arm by Weems is about able to leave the hospital although all of the lead has not been removed from the arm.

Railroad Cannot Sell Land.

Grants Pass, Or., Aug. 26.—When the town of Grants Pass was organized Jonathan Bourne, present United States senator, gave a railroad right of way and depot grounds with the provision that it should be used for such purposes only. Part of the property is partially unoccupied and the city would like to exchange other grounds for corners at railroad crossings on Fifth and Sixth streets but the railroad cannot give deed because it is still bound by the clause in the deed.

NO INDICATIONS OF STRIKE SEEN

Demand Recognition of Federation of Crafts, Closed Shop Policies.

General Manager J. P. O'Brien of the Harriman lines in Oregon returned last night from a tour of inspection, but his presence in the city did not develop any new features in the negotiations between the company's shop employees and the officials. Mr. O'Brien has not yet been approached by the representatives of the employees on the subject, and there is said to be no indications of an immediate strike unless word ordering such a step should come from union headquarters in the east.

Assistant General Manager Buckley stated this morning that the chief demand of the employees is recognition of a federation of crafts, each of which has its respective union, and the strict enforcement of closed shop policies.

"The company has always recognized and treated with the individual unions," said Mr. Buckley, "but now it is asked that recognition be given a federation of the various unions, and this the company has refused to do. We have been laying off men from time to time since the first of the year because of a constant decrease in our earnings, so the discharge of men during the past several weeks has nothing in common with the strike talk. I attribute the heavy decrease in revenue during the past several weeks due largely to a falling off of the forest product movement. The lumber market has been dull and rail shipments have been light."

"We are opposed to recognition of a federation because we can deal as well with the individual unions and we are opposed to absolutely closed shop policies."

"The shop employee representatives have not yet put the matter up to General Manager O'Brien and I don't think anything will be done until this has been done. Assistant General Manager Graham has notified the respective unions that they will meet and confer with them as in the past."

The unions represented in the proposed federation are the machinists, boiler-makers, blacksmiths, metal workers and car men.

SUSPECTED PURSE SNATCHER CAUGHT

Mrs. Joyce Lavine and Mrs. E. A. Jones, stopping at the Joyce hotel, and Miss Lillian Herscham of Vancouver were attacked last night by purse snatchers near the Y. M. C. A. and as a result of the encounter Mrs. Lavine lost a purse containing \$5. Clarence Wilson, aged 21 years, was captured through the quick pursuit of George Koussoff of 279 Columbia street, in the rear of a restaurant on Main near Fifth street.

The three women were walking along the street when suddenly three men jumped from behind a building and both grabbed at purses held by the women. As they screamed a crowd of young men from the Y. M. C. A. ran into the street and pursued the purse snatchers, one of whom escaped, but a suspect was afterwards arrested in the Buckingham hotel, who proved to be Louis Hoffman, recently released from the county jail by Judge McGinn because of contributing to the delinquency of Amber Christiansen, a 14-year-old girl.

Wilson made a desperate attempt to escape, but Koussoff attacked him and a desperate encounter managed to knock Wilson to the ground in the rear of a restaurant.

Wilson lost his hat in the mix-up, which his victim found and which was turned over to Wilson when he was charged with robbery.

PHONE COMPANY TO BUILD SKYSCRAPER

An official announcement was made today that, as a site for a 12 story building in which to centralize its Portland business, the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company has purchased from S. Benson 100 by 100 feet at the southeast corner of Park and Oak streets. The consideration involved in the transaction was \$160,000.

W. J. Phillips, division commercial superintendent of the company, said this morning that as soon as the necessary plans are completed an eight or twelve story fireproof building will be erected covering the quarter block.

The parcel purchased by the telephone company is the 140 x 140 half block purchased about 18 months ago by Mr. Benson from John B. Yeon for \$275,000.

HASSAM PAVING CO. IS PENALIZED \$250

The Oregon Hassam Paving company was penalized \$250 by the street committee of the executive board yesterday for not completing the contract for paving on Lombard street on time. The company was seven days late. The contract provided for \$60 a day penalty for each day beyond the time limit. The old street board, under Mayor Simon's administration, decided to reduce the penalty from \$350 to \$250. This action was approved by the present board.

City Engineer Harburt said he did not believe the company should be penalized because he thought the city was about as much at fault as the company. He admitted that the company had more work than it could do, but said the city was partially to blame for letting a contract to the company under such conditions.

INSTEAD OF WATER TO FIRE, THIS FIRE IS TAKEN TO THE WATER

Dayton, Wash., Aug. 26.—Dragging the fire to water was the unusual method used by Eckler mountain Thursday afternoon, when Lambert and McClary's threshing machine was enveloped in flames by a smut explosion in the separator. The crew attached the engine to the machine and hauled the blazing burden to the water tank some little distance. In half an hour the crew was back to work.

FIANCEE LIES ILL WITH PNEUMONIA

Mrs. Frank E. Jago, of this city, has received word that her cousin, Miss Helena Stalo, whose engagement to Nils Florman, son of Admiral Florman, of the Swedish navy, was announced about two weeks ago from Cincinnati, is seriously ill with pneumonia.

Mrs. Jago, wife of Commercial Jago of the Portland Commercial club, was the favorite niece of the late Alexander McDonald, vice-president of the Standard Oil company, who died in California last year, and her cousin, the Misses Laura and Helena Stalo, inherited the vast McDonald fortune, estimated at about \$50,000,000, the sisters being granddaughters of the late millionaire.

Mrs. Jago's maiden name was Miss Maye Palmer, and for a long time until Mr. McDonald's death in California, Mr. and Mrs. Jago lived at Dalry, Mr. McDonald's beautiful Cincinnati mansion.

Mrs. Jago is in receipt of a letter stating that Miss Laura Stalo expects to make her home with her sister, who, after the wedding, will move to New York where Mr. Florman, who has a large wealth in his own name, is engaged in business.

MONEY IS PAID TO POLICEMAN BY ERROR

Because he made a mistake and paid a policeman instead of the chauffeur, W. L. Morgan, an east side merchant, has become the subject of a report to Chief Slover by Patrolman C. E. Frey. Frey turned in \$5 received from Morgan as evidence of attempt to bribe an officer. Morgan when questioned at the district attorney's office, said he merely made a mistake and paid the wrong man.

The incident took place about 1 o'clock Friday morning, when a small party came from Mr. Morgan's house to enter a taxicab. The taxicab engines were left running and the noise made by the machine and the party attracted the policeman, who cautioned them to make less noise. Frey reported that Morgan said, "Oh, that's all right, cop," and slipped a \$5 piece into his hand as he turned to drive away.

Morgan reported that after arriving at his destination on the west side he started to dismiss the taxi driver, and the driver said he had not been paid. Morgan could not understand, and insisted he had already paid the bill. Finally he took the driver's name and number. When the policeman's report was called to his attention instead of the driver got the \$5. The money turned in by the policeman will be paid to the taxicab company.

REFUSES TO SAY HE PAID OUT COIN FOR HIS RELEASE

Townsend, Former Prisoner at Linnton Rockpile Says to Talk Might Do an Injustice to Briggs.

Arley J. Townsend, who has made statements involving Superintendent A. S. Briggs and Guard Anderson of the Linnton rock pile in charges that he was released from serving his time by means of money, but stopped short of telling how, when or where the money was paid, was equally uncommunicative today and declined to say whether or not he paid money for his release.

"I might be doing Mr. Briggs an injustice, you know," he said. "I don't want to get mixed up in this any further."

When it was suggested that he is already well "mixed" and that an explanation was desired only as to what money was paid, if any, for his release, where and to whom, he said he had carried on his negotiations with Anderson, the guard, and not with Briggs.

Again pressed to answer if Anderson or anyone else had been paid any money, he would not answer either way. Townsend is now serving a year's sentence on a larceny charge. In January he was picked up for drunkenness at a time he was supposed to be serving out a previous sentence at Linnton rock pile for assault with a deadly weapon at that time he says he negotiated with Anderson for his release for \$150.

CORPORATION MUST PAY ANNUAL DUES OR FINE

Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—Laying claim to a check for \$58 held in the treasury for two years because the owner was not known, will cost the incorporators of the Portland Brick Enamel & Concrete company an additional \$67.50. The company filed articles of incorporation in 1909 and sent \$58 over the filing fee. The change was returned but was not received and came back to the secretary of state where it was deposited in the vault. Seeing the story of the check in the papers, W. D. Blue wrote to have sent him stating the corporation would be dissolved. But in order to dissolve the corporation must pay fees and dues totaling \$127.75. If it does not do so it is liable to a fine for non-payment of annual dues and failure to report.
