

NIGHT RIDERS' CASE IN PROGRESS TODAY

Technical Motion to Quash
Will Usher in Prosecution
of Long Valley Men.

(Special to The Journal.)
Boise, Idaho, Aug. 28.—The legal battle that is to take place in the federal court next month when the government brings to trial 30-odd defendants, prominent and influential residents of the Long valley country, under indictment for conspiring to defraud the United States out of valuable lands and to deprive entrymen of their rights to file on public domain, is destined to be most important. The preliminary maneuvers are taking place today before Judge Frank S. Dietrich when a motion to quash the indictments are a demurrer to the true bill are being argued. If these legal technicalities are swept aside the defendants will be forced to stand trial on the charge as made by the government.

Accused Men Help Marshal Out.
The case promises to be sensational. It is remarkable in the fact that when the deputy marshal went into Long valley among the accused men to serve warrants of arrest, they were word to one another to congregate at Roseberry and there met the marshal in a body, accepted service of the warrants and without exception gave bonds of \$1500 each to appear in court to answer the charge. This was an innovation in Idaho for the service of papers upon defendants charged with a criminal offense against the laws of the United States. The defendants take the stand they are innocent of the allegations and they have nothing to fear when their side of the story is heard by the jury that is selected to try them.

Nature of the Charges.
In this general allegation the indictment charges the defendants with claiming jumping in that they used unlawful influences to frighten entrymen and when they had driven them from the land desired they filed upon it themselves or so arranged the filing that one of their members should secure the land. The government refuses to disclose the evidence that it has to substantiate the allegations but it is known that it will produce witnesses to prove that not only were peacefully inclined entrymen harassed to leave the country, but in several instances threats to do bodily harm were used, resulting in the entrymen fleeing in terror from the valley, which is considered one of the richest in the state. Other entries were contested, the defendants being charged with conspiring to testify against the entryman in favor of the contest.

The defendants named are known as the most prominent residents of Long valley located in Boise county and which is supposed to be tapped by two railroads. It is claimed, the Idaho Northern, through its extension to the Payette lakes, and the Gilmore & Pittsburg, reliably reported to be part of a new Hill line headed for San Francisco.

There are 32 defendants in all named.

WORST FROST IN 20 YEARS VISITS TWO PROVINCES

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 28.—Reports of extreme heavy frost, the worst in 20 odd years, are coming in from all over the northern portion of Saskatchewan and northern Alberta Saturday. Gilbert Plains and other points reported from six to eight degrees of frost, with vines and small vegetation severely hit. In places the frost was so severe that the grain snapped under foot and grave fear is expressed by farmers that the late grain has been seriously injured.

Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 28.—Probably the last parade of the G. A. R. was held in this city last week. Each year there is a sad thinning of the ranks of the men who saved the country half a century ago and those who marched this week showed pathetically ravages of time.

Aside from this, the most striking feature of the recent encampment to me was the splendid women sent by the west to take part in the various women's auxiliaries of the G. A. R. They have the energy, the executive ability and the will to give powerful aid in carrying out the aims of the grand army.

In recognition of this an Oregon woman, Mrs. Cora A. Davis of Union, Or., was chosen to head the National Woman's Relief Corps and a Colorado woman was elected national president of the ladies of the G. A. R.

Finer selections could not have been made. They bring the strength and freshness of the west to their work and these splendid organizations cannot but flourish under their administration.

The younger women of the west also are doing their share. There was not a more notable delegate in Rochester this week than Miss Anna Myrtle Kelly of Pueblo, Colo., who is visiting the national president of the Daughters of Veterans. I do not recall any organization in which the work of the women is more heartily recognized and more highly appreciated than the G. A. R.

From the first the old soldiers have recognized the fact that the wives and mothers bore the brunt of the great war to fully as great a degree as the men in the field and has always been a power in the work of the G. A. R. These fine women from the west have fully measured up to the standard.

WASHOUGAL PREPARES TO RECEIVE GOVERNOR

Washougal, Wash., Aug. 28.—With the news that Governor Hay is to visit this city next Wednesday, preparations have been started to furnish him a hearty welcome. Together with a state highway commissioner Governor Hay is to be met at Cape Horn by automobiles from this place, and the party will be brought over the state road in the morning, following which will be a mass meeting in the park at which Governor Hay will speak. On the way from Cape Horn, the party, if possible, will make a side trip to the little recently purchased by Major Biddle, which commands a view of the entire Washougal valley and the farming district drained by the state road, so that the governor may judge from personal survey the importance and usefulness of this highway. After the meeting and dinner, he will proceed on to Camas.

NEW "AEROPLANE GUN" BELIEVED A SUCCESS

Washington, Aug. 28.—The navy department today completed successful tests of the "aeroplane gun," designed by Admiral Twining. The model gun, a one-pounder, will be used to design a similar three-pound gun. These new guns will shortly be placed on every vessel in the American navy. The firing today demonstrated that with the one-pound gun a shot could be hurled 18,000 feet in the air. The new three-pounder will throw shells seven and a half miles skyward at the rate of 50 a minute.

TREATY CAMPAIGN STIRS ALL CANADA

Struggle Over Reciprocity Becomes Most Heated of Kind in History.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 28.—The Canadian election precipitated by the American reciprocity treaty is in full blast and is one of the most heated and bitter campaigns ever held in Canada.

From the first the campaign conservatives have largely avoided the discussion of the reciprocity agreement and its terms. Their opposition has been stated to be almost wholly upon national or British grounds. That position is maintained up to the present moment and it is being held persistently by even the Conservative leaders. It must remain to be seen whether it will effect against the direct appeal and the propriety of the people embodied in the reciprocity agreement, as it is interpreted by the Liberals. Most Canadians resent any imputation against the loyalty and Liberals believe the loyalty cry will react the Conservatives particularly as the only preference ever given to Great Britain by Canada in fiscal matters was given by the present Liberal government.

For the last 10 days Mr. Borden has been campaigning in Ontario, where he hopes for success.

The province is overwhelmingly British in race and sentiment and hence appeals along his well planned line are expected to make most impression. Laurier has never yet had a majority in Ontario, though he would dearly love one. Ontario lies so closely along the American border and the farmers of this province are so energetic that they are supposed to strongly desire the American markets. Hence the herculean appeals of both leaders, one to the farmers' pocket and the other to his sentiment.

OPEN COLUMBIA CONGRESS, PLAN

Wenatchee Is to Be the Place
Because Halfway Between
Source and Mouth.

Wenatchee, Wash., Aug. 28.—Prof. W. D. Lyman of Whitman college, Walla Walla, will address the Wenatchee Commercial club next Friday night and outline a plan for calling an open Columbia river congress to be held in this city probably in October. He proposes this city because it is located midway between the source and mouth of the river and efforts will be made to secure attendance of delegates from Canada and all Columbia river points north of here as well as south, including Portland. Senators Poinsett of this state, and Chamberlain of Oregon, are said to have endorsed the enterprise and signified their willingness to make addresses.

An open river congress was suggested because the transportation congress held here last winter resulted at once in agitating the need and opportunities of north central Washington for railroads to such an extent that there are now three strong corporations in the field engaged in a contest to secure the necessary franchises for an inter-urban electric system covering 200 miles. The Great Northern was also influenced to take definite action although President Hill himself acknowledged that the board of directors had no intention to build for several years.

Now that railroad transportation seems almost accomplished, those working for the building of an empire in the Wenatchee district now believe the next big move is to concentrate on an open Columbia river in order that this great section may be prepared to receive its share of the benefit to be derived from the Panama canal.

TEXAS SENATE TABLES BAILEY ENDORSEMENT

Austin, Texas, Aug. 28.—Senator J. W. Bailey's stand on the tariff question was Saturday repudiated in the state senate by a vote of 15 to 8, when a resolution that endorsed his position was tabled. The motion for tabling the resolution was made by Senator Real, the only Republican member.

ONTARIO CLUB AND BAND ON VISIT TO FRUITLAND

Ontario, Ont., Aug. 28.—The Ontario Commercial club accompanied by the Ontario band visited Fruitland Friday evening on its second annual get-acquainted trip. Ontario people went over in 15 automobiles and other conveyances and fully 1000 people gathered in the streets of the fast growing little town in the Payette valley to listen to the band concert and addresses by Mayor A. W. Trow of Ontario, C. E. Kenyon, J. R. Blackaby, president of the Ontario Commercial club, and C. H. Sargent, the Fruitland orchardist and business man, who officiated as chairman.

The friendly feeling between these two towns has been greatly augmented by the building of the Ontario-Shake river wagon bridge and their trade and social relations are such that the interests of the two towns have become almost identical.

Upper Dead Ox Flat Studied.

Ontario, Ont., Aug. 28.—The committee of seven recently appointed by a mass meeting to consider the most feasible way of furnishing water for the irrigation of Upper Dead Ox Flat now has engineers surveying the country on the high bench lands north of Ontario to determine the cost of installing pumping plants and canals and ditches. The work has just been started but from information gained it will probably be necessary to raise the water, which will be taken from Snake river, about 300 feet to gain the highest level. As soon as this is completed the approximate cost will be known and steps will be taken to install a plant.

Cannons Melted Into Coins.

Paris, Aug. 28.—The French government is melting up old cannons into one and two cent pieces. There will be 2,925,000 francs worth of the coins put into circulation.

WILDE AND ATTORNEY RETURN TO SAN DIEGO

Louis J. Wilde, the indicted banker, accompanied by his attorney, Charles E. Sumner, of Los Angeles, left Saturday night for San Diego. While he expects to be gone only three weeks, he announced that he would certainly be here for his trial, which is expected late in September.

Dan J. Malarkey, who is associated with Mr. Sumner in Wilde's defense, will leave during the week for the east to be gone about a month. There is an understanding that the trial will not be called until Mr. Malarkey's return. Wilde left for San Diego in order to

take care of his personal business which has been neglected for some time. The disclosure of some facts concerning the alleged embezzlement and the indictment is promised on his return.

PARK BAND CONCERT DRAWS BIG CROWD

Brown's park band drew a large audience in City Park yesterday afternoon, and the concert was one of the best given this season. The program included a number of operatic selections that struck such a responsive chord that they had to be repeated. A

Brown is preparing an all-star program for the occasion. Two evening concerts will be given this week, Wednesday evening at Holladay park, and Friday evening at Chapman square.
