

LAUGHS FOLLOW THICK AND FAST

Skit by Hermine Shone and Company Headliner at Orpheum.

The bill at the Orpheum this week presents an interesting array of varied acts that go to make a good program. Hermine Shone and her company in "The Little Goddess" are back again to headline the bill, and the act loses nothing by repetition. The cast is practically the same, and the set unusually pleasing. Miss Shone is just as attractive, and John Sterling as able a laugh producer as could be desired. The skit abounds with funny situations cleverly handled, and laughs follow thick and fast.

The Primrose Four, with their 1000 pounds of harmony, made a tremendous hit with their solos and quartet work. Their bass is low, their tenor high, their volume mighty, their songs good and their act a winner.

Running the "Primrose Four" a close race for even honors are the Three Leightons, presenting "A One-Night Stand in Minstrelsy." The latter is sly, and their song "Steamboat Bill" mighty good. The dancing and appearance of the bell hop Leightons alone would make the act go, but it is well balanced and just long enough to be right. They close with a ragtime ball game.

The Blank family do some remarkable juggling stunts of the breath taking variety. They introduce many new ideas and perform hazardous feats with ease and skill, which won much merited applause.

Other big favorites were Wilson and Wilson. Adelaide is about the trimmest and cunningest little party at the Orpheum for many moons, and Charles scores heavily with his face and eccentric violin playing. They are a happy combination for laughing purposes.

Wood brothers, Irish athletes, open the bill with clever work on the double flying rings. Almost all of their turns are new since their last visit, and many daring and difficult feats are easily accomplished.

Benjamin Horning and his company offer Mr. Horning's sketch, "A Surgical Courtship," which has its bright spots, even though it is too talky in other. Mr. Horning is a clever and finished character actor who will be remembered as a member of the Baker stock company.

BISHOP TO BE TAKEN TO SPOKANE FOR TRIAL

An order for the removal of W. E. Bishop, an alleged "white slave," who was brought to Portland from Enterprise, Or., by Deputy United States Marshal Hamlin, to Spokane, was granted this morning by Judge Wolverton. He will be taken to the Washington city today or tomorrow.

Bishop is charged with having taken a woman named Ruby Brickley from Moscow, Idaho, to Colfax, Wash., and from there to Portland. He is held under \$2500 bonds.

Chris Lewis, a Greek, will be brought to this city from La Grande today by Deputy United States Marshal Hamlin. Lewis is accused by the husband of Grace Dillman of Pendleton of transporting his wife to La Grande from Walla Walla, Wash. The woman is said to be but 17 years of age, and she was visiting friends at Walla Walla when she met Lewis. The husband, hearing of the elopement of the pair to La Grande, filed a complaint and both were arrested. Lewis is held on a charge of "white slavery."

MESKILL, WASH., MEN BUY CHEHALIS LUMBER PLANT

(Special to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Aug. 29.—David Urquhart and W. E. Macomber, owners of the Chehalis Lumber & Shingle company, have closed a deal for the sale of their saw and shingle mill business to W. R. Starkey and W. J. Southwick of Meskill. The deal includes between six and seven million feet of timber. The mill has a capacity of 25,000 feet daily. The consideration was \$18,000. About 300,000 feet of lumber at the mill was not included in the deal. The new owners will take immediate possession. A logging road will be built a short distance, after which the plant will start. Shipments by rail can be made by a short haul to the logging road of the Harb & Brown Lumber company, which operates a mill at Chehalis, whence they can be delivered to the Northern Pacific main line.

Clever Sarcasm Is Aimed at Schools

"Fun in Hi Skool" provides fun for the spectator at Pantages and the hilarious sketch makes a good lead for an excellent bill. George Marx, the merry old master, provokes laughter continually and is well supported by his three brothers and a good company. The skit is a clever bit of sarcasm aimed at the modern school methods. Miss Grace Desmond enlivens the act with a solo and other musical selections are interspersed.

Another irresistible playlet is "Back to Boston," the story of an ex-prizefighter who accidentally undertakes the training of a youth who wants to become physically fit. A pretty love story involving the youth's sister is woven into the plot. The mystery surrounding the identity of "The White Man's Hope" does not detract from the pleasing quality of his voice which is considered one of the best in vaudeville of the day. The dancing of the whole troupe is artistic and the singing of several Balkan folk songs adds to the charm of the act. The novelty of the bill is presented by Mons Herbert, the musical waiter, who sets the table to music which he draws from the dishes, food, knives and forks and other dinner accessories.

Miss Allie Leslie, with her baby imitations and peculiar patter, has made a hit on her first appearance in the west. The daylight animated events and several new films on the Pantage scope complete a good bill.

IRRIGATION PLAN HEARD AT ASHLAND

(Special to The Journal.) Ashland, Or., Aug. 29.—A party of San Francisco capitalists left for the south today after a thorough inspection of a potentially great irrigation project. The group expressed itself as highly pleased with the feasibility of the project and willing to put its money in it if it could secure the patronage of 7000 acres of land. This will be a comparatively easy matter as there is a large tract adjacent to Ashland, which has been retarded for several years only because of the lack of water. The tract comprises all that land on the north side of Bear creek from a point about four miles east of Ashland to the Western orchard near Medford. It is said the water to be used in this development project can be secured in sufficient quantities to irrigate 15,000 acres and still leave sufficient in the reservoirs to flood the entire project at any time.

It is proposed to store the winter flow from both Bear and Keene creeks in two huge reservoirs, the one acting as a reserve for the other. While not a part of the present plan, it is declared that Buck lake can be turned into the same channels and used in the future if needed. This means that while other projects require the carrying of water over vast distances, Ashland has within a distance of five miles abundance of water for this area of land. Much enthusiasm is manifest among holders of land in the area under consideration, as it means the doubling of values if the scheme becomes assured.

Beilham, Wash., Aug. 29.—While the owner was below tapping a keg of beer, two masked and armed men last night entered the saloon of Hugh Janesch at Concrete, shot and seriously wounded John Glasgow, emptied the till of \$100 and made off. Two men besides the robbers' victim were in the place at the time, but they lined up against the wall after the thugs had fired several shots. A posse headed by a deputy sheriff is in pursuit.

DUNIWAY WILL RESIST IN COURTS IF OUSTED

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 29.—Declaring that secretaries of state have heretofore not furnished space in the statehouse to the state printer through courtesy but because they were directed to do so by legislative enactment, State Printer Willis S. Dunway addressed a public letter

to Secretary of State Olcott yesterday afternoon, declaring he would not move until the question had been determined by the proper tribunal.

"Since the plant has been located in its present quarters," declares Mr. Dunway, "all legislative assemblies have known its location and have considered the advantages to the state worth the space."

"I have been unable to find that this declaration of the legislative will has at any time been rescinded or repealed and I am therefore advised that the occupancy of the quarters used by me in the transaction of my official duties is expressly warranted by law and that I can not be lawfully ousted

from them without some new legislation."

"Notwithstanding this fact, I am willing, as stated in my letter of June 5, to cooperate with you to relieve the congested condition referred to in your letter of June 3. For example, I may be able to get along with less office space than now occupied, which would possibly provide for some department now crowded."

"I am not willing, however, to remove my plant from its present quarters."
