Weather Conditions.

The north central high pressure field is drifting slowly eastward and is central this morning over Lake Superior; another area of high pressure is advancing from the ocean inland over Oregon and Washington. Moderate depressions are central over Alberta, Arizona and Alabama, respectively. Except in eastern Montana, the Dakotas, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, there has been a quite general increase of pressure over the country within the last 12 hours. Light rain has fallen at Tatoosh Island, in northern Alberta, Colorado, southern Utah, and New Mexico, and light to heavy rains were reported from the Gulf states and nearly all states east of the Mississippi river and lake region. A very heavy rainfall of 4.50 inches occurred at Shreveport, La. The weather is warmer in northern California and in the northern Rocky mountains, central and northern plains, and northern plains states; and it is cooler in northwestern Oregon, and from Texas westward to the Pacific coast region and St. Lawrence valley. Light frosts were reported from Duluth and Green Bay.

The indications are for generally fair weather in this district during the next 36 hours, except that showers are expected for this afternoon or tonight in northwestern Washington. It will be cooler tonight in southeastern Idaho.

Acting District Forecaster.

Fighters to Rockpile.—Patrolman Foster, while patrolling the north-end alone last night, at 9 o'clock saw a free-for-all fight at Third and Davis streets, and immediately set about to stop the trouble. He saw three Mexicans, one with a drawn knife, fighting and slashing, while two men were on the ground. When the rioters saw Foster, they started to run with Foster in close pursuit. From Third and Davis, the patrolman followed by a howling mob of more than 100 persons, kept up the chase to Front and Ankeny streets. Here Foster overtook one of the men and arrested him, while the two others turned to assist their comrade. The mob however arrived at this time and all jumped on the other two. As a result E. Martin, James Blain and Salvador Salas were handcuffed together and brought to police headquarters. This morning sentences of 30, 40 and 30 days were meted out in the order of the names mentioned.

Oregon System.—Terms of the initiative, referendum and recall, as they will operate under the commission form of government in Portland, were considered by the subcommittee of the people's charter revision committee at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the offices of Isaac Sweet, Yeon building. The members of the committee are Alfred D. Cridge, Isaac Sweet and F. C. Barnes. The subcommittee will prepare two reports, one to be submitted at the next Thursday evening meeting of the general committee and one at the following meeting.

Bartender Fined \$100.—Jack Wimme, bartender at Larson's saloon, 514 North Third street, was arrested at 10 o'clock last night by Patrolman Madden and Foster, for selling liquor to Lee Johnson, a drunken man. Wimme declared that he did not realize that the man was drunk, but the patrolman declared that Johnson was so drunk he could not stand at the bar without holding on. The bartender was fined \$100 this morning for selling liquor to an intoxicated man and Johnson was fined \$10.

ARCTIC BROTHERHOOD TO MEET IN PORTLAND

The eleventh annual convention of the grand camp of the Arctic Brotherhood, which will be held in Portland November 14-15-16, is of far deeper significance to Portland than would appear from a casual glance. Over 500 of the most prominent and representative business and professional men, representing every part of Alaska and the Northwest territory, will be here for the convention and a splendid opportunity will be open for the business men of Portland to get acquainted with the business men of that great territory to cement the old relations and to bring about new ones.

Portland should have the immense trade of that region or at least a share of it. One firm alone recently placed a cash order of over \$15,000 for merchandise for a north and there are many as large or larger to be had. The delegates while here will be the guests of the local Alaska club, an organization less than a year old, through whose efforts the convention was secured for this city. This is the first time a convention of the Brotherhood has been held as far south.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Alaska club at the Commercial club last night it was decided to raise a fund of at least \$5000 to provide for the entertainment of the visitors. A committee was appointed by President F. W. Swanton for this purpose and they will immediately start a campaign for the desired amount. E. H. Collins was elected permanent secretary and, in the preparation of the entertainment program and raising of the funds, he will have the assistance of C. C. Chapman, publicity manager of the Commercial club. A design for a badge was selected and \$500 ordered for immediate delivery.

SECRET SERVICE MEN BEGIN WAR ON SURVEYOR

 San Francisco, Aug. 29.—War with special agents of the treasury department and Surveyor of the Port Duncan McKinlay as the belligerents, has been declared.

Hostilities broke out when McKinlay reprimanded the treasury agents for making unproven charges of dereliction of duty against Inspector Joseph Wilson. The agents reported the reprimand to Chief Wilkie of the secret service and also lodged a complaint at Washington that McKinlay had belittled them in the eyes of the inspectors they had been detailed to watch.

LINEMEN REFUSE TO ACCEPT SMITH'S TERMS

All chance of settling the strike of the linemen of the Mount Hood Railway & Power company without another conference between the representative of the union and the company was ended last night, when the members of the Linemen's union refused to accept the terms offered by the company through its chief engineer, C. S. Smith.

The main cause of dissension was the refusal of the company to recognize the union and the demand for individual contracts with its employees. The demand of the company that all grievances must be settled by the individual or individuals concerned with the official part above the one against whom the grievance was directed was another point which they could not swallow.

Chief Engineer Smith is at present out of the city on a business trip in eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho and is not expected back until tomorrow. On his return it is probable that another conference will be held and another attempt made to reach some agreement. Mr. Smith said before he left that he sincerely hoped the trouble could be brought to a close and that as long as there was a chance of an agreement he would be glad to discuss the points of contention with the committee.

4 HOPELESSLY INSANE SENT TO OLD HOMES

 Salem, Or., Aug. 29.—The first non-resident insane patients to be transported out of the state by means of the appropriation made by the last legislature for that purpose were yesterday when A. Rosenthal was sent to Lyons, Ky., M. Belourney to Montreal, Que., George Prehm to St. Paul, and Jack Miller to Lebanon, Pa. These are hopeless cases where the patients would have to remain in the asylum supported by the state all their lives. An appropriation of \$2000 was made by the last legislature for sending such patients back to the asylums of the states from which they come. This will result in a big saving of expense to Oregon.

School Work at State Fair.
 Salem, Or., Aug. 29.—The schools of Salem and Marion county are getting in line for exhibiting the manual training products of the schools at the state fair. Individual pupils or schools may exhibit any article of sewing, drawing, composition or agriculture. Liberal prizes are offered. County Superintendent Smith of Marion has a list of 100 rural school pupils who have reported that they were interested in planting gardens for exhibit purposes at the state fair. He is preparing to send reports from them. The school exhibits at the state fair promise to be elaborate.

A. J. GILLIS IS MAYOR OF WALLA WALLA NOW

 Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 29.—Winning the last fight of a battle for commission government, the candidates of the Commission Government League yesterday won out over the independent candidates by majorities ranging from 7 to 195.

A. J. Gillis, commission candidate, beat T. M. McKinney, for mayor; A. K. Dice and George Struthers won over Oscar Drumheller and Byron Luthier for commissioners. Struthers had but seven votes lead.

The election is the culmination of a struggle of several months for commission government. The new commissioners take office September 11 and they will hold their positions until December, 1914. They have the appointing of all other city offices and the fixing of salaries.

PAT MULLINS IS BEATEN BY A. J. SPLAWN IN PRIMARIES AT YAKIMA

The four candidates nominated for the two commissionerships were Wilbur Crocker, J. W. Brooker, H. W. Redman and Simeon Dupree.
