A trough shaped low pressure area of no great energy extends from British Columbia south to Arizona. It, however, was of sufficient strength to cause a light rain along the coast between Marshfield and Eureka and in the lower Willamette valley and western Washington. No rain was reported at any of the weather bureau stations between the Rocky and Cascade ranges of mountains. Thunder storms have occurred in portions of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and South Dakota and local rains have fallen along the gulf and south Atlantic coasts. They were especially heavy at Charleston, S. C., where three inches fell in the last 24 hours. It is much cooler in the interior of western Oregon and western Washington, and in the Dakotas, Nebraska and Minnesota.

The conditions are favorable for fair and warmer weather Sunday in western Oregon and western Washington and for showers and thunder storms with lower temperatures in the eastern portion of these states and in Idaho.
