

GRAY IS SILENT WHEN HILL SURVEY IS TOPIC

(Special to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Sept. 5.—Carl Gray, president of the Oregon Electric Railway, arrived in Eugene last evening in an automobile having made the trip from Salem through the rain and mud. Mr. Gray came to Eugene to look at the ground recently bought by agents of the company for a depot site and terminal grounds and to arrange for a franchise on more streets in the city than Fifth street, over which thoroughfare the Oregon Electric will enter Eugene from the north and on which the passenger depot will be located. It is said that the company desires to build a loop extending from Fifth street to the southern part of the city over High street,

turning west on Fifteenth street or some other street in that vicinity and thence north on Olive street to Fifth street again. Mr. Gray did not say when the contract for the extension of the Oregon Electric south to Eugene would be let, but from his remarks it was inferred that work would not cease at Albany but would continue to Eugene when that city is reached. He did not deny or affirm that the Hill people were behind the surveyors, who are very active between this city and the coast, viewing a line to Coos Bay.
