

PATHETIC STORY WINS LENIENCY

Judge Gatens Sentences Flower for Embezzlement Then Grants Parole.

On the plea that he used the money he embezzled to send his wife and her father east to attend the funeral of his mother, A. W. Flower, alias Robert H. Russell, gained the sympathy of Presiding Judge Gatens in the circuit court yesterday afternoon, and was permitted to go on parole after being sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary.

Flower promised that he will take good care of his wife and two children, obey all the laws and repay the money he took as fast as he can. He must also report once a month to the chief probation officer. As he turned to leave the court room his happy wife kissed him, and with wife and children close behind him he walked to freedom, after having been in jail since June.

Flower was an employee of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, and took \$653.67. He had replaced \$50 when the embezzlement was discovered. Judge Gatens told him that as this was his first offense he will be given a chance to make good. The railroad has been repaid by a surety company. Flower's story was told by his attorney, John H. Stevenson, and Deputy District Attorney Michael, representing the state, made no objection to parole.

Charles Milan entered a plea of guilty on advice of his attorney, L. C. Mackey, and was sentenced to serve an indeterminate time in the state penitentiary for stealing \$25 from the store of Frank Rosumny. He induced his young pal, John Kelly, to engage in a fight with Rosumny, while he robbed the till. As Kelly was led into the affair by Milan, the indictment against him was dismissed. Milan admitted that he had served a term in another state for burglary.

Indictments against William Frasier and Frank Angelo were dismissed on motion of the district attorney, as the defendants are each serving sentences of one year at the rockpile.

Louis Soaman, charged with taking the earnings of a fallen woman, entered a plea of not guilty. Earl Rockford, accused of a statutory crime, was arraigned and allowed time for pleading. A demurrer was overruled in the case of C. B. Robinson, charged with passing a forged check on J. M. Burroughs.

FOURTH HUSBAND TAKES WOMAN 90 MILES FROM A RAILROAD TO RESIDE

Bend, Or., Sept. 13.—From a home of affluence in Seattle to a cabin on the sagebrush plains 50 miles southeast of Bend, in order that she may be with the man she loves, Mrs. Ella M. Ives of Seattle, now Mrs. Charles S. Etnier, today took up her residence 90 miles from the nearest railroad. With her fiancé, she came to Opal City in order to be married by the same minister who performed the ceremony for her daughter at Laidlaw, in June, 1908. In a tent in which is conducted a restaurant, the marital vows were said on September 4. This is the fourth venture of the bride in matrimony. Her former husbands all met violent deaths. Mr. Ives being drowned in Alaska while his wife was holding down a homestead at Laidlaw. She owns much real estate in Seattle, including valuable waterfront property. Mr. Etnier resigned his position with the Peck-Judah company, Inc., a general advertising and information bureau of Seattle, to homestead in central Oregon.

URGE LAW AGAINST CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Resolutions asking the enactment of a law forbidding capital punishment, approving Governor West in his commuting of Webb's sentence, and applauding Mayor Rushlight and Chief Slover for their effort to stop the city were adopted last night by the Brotherhood of the East Side Baptist church assembled in special.

"It cannot be denied that ex-Mayor Simon left Mayor Rushlight a nasty inheritance of permitted evil, and this forms a mass that must be gotten out of the road before the city can be decent or clean," said the pastor, Albert Ehrgott, addressing the men.

Officers of the brotherhood were elected for the year as follows: A. G. Bishop, president; J. W. Bulger, vice president; Leslie J. Werschkul, secretary-treasurer. Music was furnished by a male quartet consisting of Dr. J. W. McMichael, Reuben R. Adams, L. J. Werschkul and A. G. Bishop. The Men and Religion Forward movement, "the twentieth century's call to the manhood of men for practical religious service," was presented in addresses by Richard R. Perkins, executive secretary of the local committee, and Marshall N. Dana.

"Lesser influences have shaken thrones and upheaved dynasties than are now at work calling men into the field," said Mr. Perkins.

A final resolution was adopted supporting Councilman Clyde in his effort to secure the installation of public lavatories at convenient places in the city. The women of the church provided an unusually fine dinner for the occasion.

TO OPERATE ON HEAD OF JUVENILE THIEF

BARRED FROM SEAT, NEGRO ASKS \$5000

Salem Head Usher Will Not Let Him and Family See Georgia Minstrels.

Salem, Or., Sept. 13.—E. C. Atkinson, negro, filed a suit against F. L. Walters, manager of the Grand Opera House in Salem, yesterday afternoon, demanding \$5000 damages, which he alleges he sustained by being refused admission to the opera house on August 15, when the Georgia Minstrels were to give a show. The complaint alleges that Atkinson had purchased tickets for himself, his wife, his daughter and had passed in to the head usher when that official refused to seat the colored family because they were negroes. The shame, Atkinson declares, was humiliating in the extreme.

Franchise Revocation Resisted.

Salem, Or., Sept. 13.—The Salem, Eugene & Eastern Railway company filed an answer yesterday afternoon to the suit started against the company by the city of Salem to revoke its franchise. It is alleged that the failure to operate a car on the entire fair ground lines was due to a broken crossing at the Southern Pacific track, which had to be repaired according to the plans and specifications of the S. P. in the east. It alleges further that it has never refused to do the paving and other improvement work required under the franchise granted by the city.

M'MANIGAL REHEARSES TESTIMONY, ALLEGED

Los Angeles, Sept. 13.—Rehearsal of the testimony he is expected to give at the McNamara trial is being practiced daily by Orrie E. McManigal in the presence of Malcolm McLaren of the Burns Detective agency, according to a statement by Jailer George Gallagher today.

Every morning at 8 o'clock McManigal is hurried across the street from the jail building to the courthouse and remains closeted with officials of the prosecution until the noon hour. He is then returned to his cell for luncheon and again at 1:30 is taken to the county prosecutor's office, remaining there the balance of the afternoon.

Judge Walter Bordwell said today that he saw no reason why the trial should not begin October 11, the date set, even though postponement would be necessary owing to a legal holiday. If a postponement is ordered, he said, it would be for some other reason.

Billy Sunday Concern Turned Down

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 13.—The state charter board has refused to grant a charter to the Billy Sunday corporation of Wichita.

The applicants proposed to organize with a capital of \$10,000 and finance Sunday in a series of revival meetings. The incorporators were to profit from the contributions. The board held this was not a religious corporation.

BEATTIE'S CONVICTION MAY BE TURNING POINT

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 13.—The conviction of Henry Clay Beattie Jr. for

the murder of his wife marks a new epoch in American life and the delinquencies of American juries, according to Judge J. W. Donovan of Detroit. Commenting today on the Beattie verdict, he said:

"American juries have been prone to deal lightly with this class of men

for many years. I do not hesitate to say that it has been the weakest spot in our judicial procedure, but I believe that the result of this case reflects the awakening of the national conscience, and I am sure that its influence will be widespread."

"The nation had to awaken to the

dangers which lurked in the wake of such a crime, and the Beattie case proved the turning point. I believe that from now on we will see fewer crimes of this nature."
