Prison Congress.—The national prison congress will be asked to convene in Portland in September, 1912, when it meets next month in Omaha. A special committee meeting yesterday afternoon in the Commercial club, at which a conference on prison methods should be held in Portland, near the time of the World's Christian Citizenship congress, which is to be held in Portland in July of 1912. If the invitation is accepted an excursion will be run from Portland to Salem during the meeting that the delegates may inspect the Oregon penitentiary. A special committee consisting of William F. Woodward, Lois G. Baldwin, W. B. McClure and Rev. W. P. White, was appointed to extend the invitation. Oregon will probably be represented at the Omaha meeting.

Mystery Cleared Up.—With the assistance of Spokane police department, which now has in custody Joe Fraters and Charles Smith, the mystery regarding the wholesale robbery of J. H. Meslin's jewelry store at 419 Hawthorne avenue on the night of August 2, has been cleared up. Detective Snow left last night for the inland Empire town to return with the two prisoners. At the same time, Snow will go to Hayden Lake to recover three diamond rings stolen from a local hotel man by Mary Jones, but given by her as tips to a grocery boy at Hayden Lake. Mary Mueller is implicated in this robbery.

Chinese Gamblers Escape.—Another unsuccessful attempt was made last night by the police to raid a Chinese gambling game at 75 1/2 North Fourth street and 62 Second street, but heavy doors barred the progress of the police and before entrance was gained the gamblers had fled, taking all the evidence except tables and chairs. Captain Bailey, Sergeant Roberts and Patrolmen Burri, Foster and Griffith broke down the barred doors and took the paraphernalia to the police headquarters.

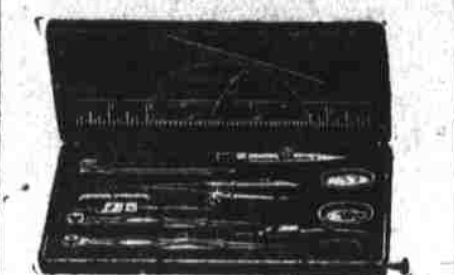
