

ONE KILLED, 1 HURT BY RUNAWAY CAR

P. R. & N. Construction Camp
at Timber, Or., Is Scene
of Accident.

Forest Grove, Or., Sept. 13.—Antonio Gregore was killed and Peter Sticer was seriously injured in an accident which occurred on the P. R. & N. Portland-Tillamook railway line, Monday. With two other men, Gregore and Sticer were on a construction camp near the construction camp at Timber, 20 miles north of this city. The car was loaded with steel rails, and while going down a slight grade the brakes gave way. Seeing that the car would strike a piece of the unfinished portion of the track before it could be stopped, the men tried to jump, but failed to get off the car in time, and were crushed when the wreck occurred.

Piling Crushes Patton's Foot.

Mr. Patton, who is about 21 years of age and married, was unloading the heavy timbers, when they became suddenly loosened, and rolled upon him. He was removed to the Forest Grove sanitarium and Dr. Baker of Gaston and Dr. Tucker of this city called. The foot is so badly crushed that amputation will likely be necessary.

RECALL IS AGAIN USED TO GET EVEN

Petitions Out Against Ness,
Who Helped Get Eugene
Officers Dismissed.

(Special to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., Sept. 13.—As a sequel to the dismissal of Chief of Police E. A. Farrington and Officer J. S. Blanton, chief of the night police, recently, a recall petition against Alderman S. P. Ness has been circulated by the friends of the officers deposed but not yet been filed. Ness, who is president of the city council, was acting as mayor during Mayor Berger's vacation, when these officers were dismissed, and the officers and their friends blame him largely for the dismissals. The vote in the council was a tie, three councilmen voting each way, and Ness, in the capacity of mayor, cast the deciding vote.

Alderman Ness and his associates in the council declare the plan to recall Ness is spurious and cite the fact that Blanton, who was dismissed, and V. M. Barland, who failed of reappointment to the office of building inspector, are among those most active in circulation of the petitions.

The recall petitions allege incompetency and that the councilman has not resided in the Fourth ward, from which he was elected, for over a year.

The council has appointed J. O. Bristol chief of police to succeed Farrington. Bristol has been acting in that capacity since the former chief's removal. He was formerly a day patrolman.

HOOD RIVER COUNCIL ORDERS RINK CLOSED

Hood River, Or., Sept. 13.—The city council has voted to close the skating rink permanently. The rink is located in the residence section of the city near the hospital. Councilman Wright, who rents the rink to the present occupants, was excused from voting at his own request. It was rumored that legal action will be taken at once to have the rink opened.

The city council voted to accept the verdict of the jury placing the value of the present water plant at \$32,441.44, and ordered two warrants drawn on the city to cover the amount and that the title pass to the city. An effort was made to have the assignment of the bid made to Morris Bros., of Portland, for the bond issue of \$50,000 at 6 per cent, set aside, and to have the bonds re-advertised at a lower rate of interest. The vote was a tie on this proposition and the mayor voted to readvertise the bonds.

SUPERINTENDENT ARANT LOOKS FOR M'DONALD

Fort Klamath, Or., Sept. 13.—To get more specific data regarding the exact spot where the equipment of B. B. Bakowski, the lost Bend, Or., photographer, was found by a man named McDonald, who penetrated to Crater lake in the winter shortly after Bakowski disappeared, the whereabouts of McDonald are sought by Superintendent F. W. Arant of Crater Lake park, who feels that now when the snow is all off one side of the lake rim and before any falls again, is the best time to discover Bakowski's body.

McDonald is a transient workman. He was in the employ of a government engineering party near Fort Klamath last winter and when told by an Indian

that he could get men all along the route from Fort Klamath to Crater lake and that there was a hotel at the lake, he decided he would walk in and see the great natural wonder. The Indian proved quite a practical joker, for many miles from the lake McDonald found snow 12 feet deep. The crust held him up, however, so he boldly pushed on, finally reaching the rim of the lake one night just at dark.

Binding the hotel at the lake closed and having only a sandwich or two, he decided to take a short cut back to Fort Klamath and in doing so became lost. He wandered and wandered, discovering meanwhile some of Bakowski's equipment, which he took along. Finally he came to a camp, the occupants of which

showed him how he could get out to Central Point. Since he arrived at Central Point, left the Bakowski article and told his story. Superintendent Arant has heard nothing from him. He is supposed to be in western Oregon or northern California at work.

Cathlamet Disappearance Solved.

Cathlamet, Wash., Sept. 13.—The finding of the drowned body of John Pickering in the river below Astoria solves the mystery of his strange disappearance a week ago. Mr. Pickering went to Astoria to have some machinery repaired. He returned the machinery, but failed to come home himself. The police of Astoria were notified, and search

was also made by his fellow lodge members of the Redmen, but no clue was found and his family of a wife and three children were deeply worried. There were no marks of violence on the body and the cause of drowning is unexplained, but the impression is that he fell off the dock in some way. He was about 35 years old and for six months had been an engineer in the employ of J. B. Miller Logging company.

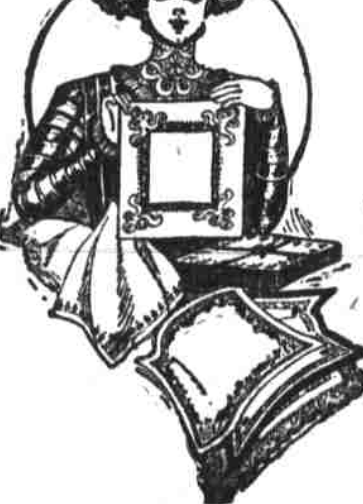
