The first unit represents the church auditorium, which is a stone structure with seating capacity of 1000 and with high basement, which ultimately is to finished up as social rooms, banquet hall, etc., but as a temporary expedient until the entire structure as proposed could be completed would serve as quarters for a Sunday school of \$00 This auditorium faces members. The third unit is also of stone and timber and comprises the main Sunday school building completing the third side of the quadrangle and paralleling Sixteenth street. This building and equipment has been given much thought and is most complete in appointment, as the crying need of the Westminster district. is facilities for the growing Sunday school.
