The films are shown by the Independent Western Flim Exchange which will show them throughout Oregon and Washing-

The pictures were shown at a private exhibition yesterday to a small au-dience. Colored moving pictures have been shown here before, but they were

The process by which this was made possible was discovered and patented by an American photographer, Urban, and an English chemist, Smith.

Eleven reels containing 176,000 distinct pictures were taken but only eight or nine will be shown owing to the length of time necessary. The length of the films is 11,000 feet.
