

SAND AND GRAVEL CONCERN SECURES TUG HAZEL WEIR

Chase & Linton Co. Makes Deal; Cash W. Weir to Take Over M. F. Hazen; New Hull to Be Built.

Increase in the sand and gravel business near Newberg, Or., has made it necessary for the Chase & Linton gravel company, which is engaged in taking gravel from the bed of the Yamhill river, to secure a larger and more powerful tug than the M. F. Hazen and they have made a deal whereby they secure the tug Hazel Weir from Cash W. Weir and the latter will take over the Hazen.

Cash Weir is the principal owner of the Hazel Weir at the custom house, vice C. W. Weir, and the tug will be taken up to Newberg as soon as possible, while the M. F. Hazen will be brought down here immediately to engage in the towing business.

The new owners of the Hazel Weir expect to have the machinery out of the old hull and into a new one by the first of the year. The new hull will be about the same dimensions as the old one, with the exception that it will be of lighter draft and will be a twin tunnel model. The Weir is a full screw tug.

CAPTAIN EKSON BUYER

Purchases Lewis River Transportation Company; to Place Boat.

Announcement was made this morning by J. Allen Harrison, superintendent of the Vancouver Transportation company, that the Lewis River Transportation company, long owned by Jacob Kann, has been sold to Captain J. W. Ekson and associates, who declare their intention of maintaining a service to Lewis river points, possibly under the old name.

"Soon after the burning of the steamer 'Mason,'" said Mr. Harrison, "the Lewis River Transportation company sold out their entire interest to the Vancouver Transportation company, and the Lewis river route has been operated under the name of the steamer 'Undine,' which was placed on the route in lieu of the burned steamer.

"The new owners will place a boat on the route as soon as arrangements can be made and in the meantime the business will be taken care of by the steamer 'Undine' as before."

Their landing at Portland will be at the foot of Taylor street and the dock business here will be taken care of by the agent, N. J. Day, and the force of the Vancouver Transportation company.

BIG WHEAT CARGO

Heliopsis Coming to Take on 207,000 Bushels of Corn.

What will probably be the largest cargo of wheat to be loaded at this port so far this season will go forth on the British steamer Heliopsis, 2847 tons, which sailed from San Francisco yesterday morning for Portland. She is under charter to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. and will load about 217,000 bushels of the cereal. The British steamer Strathmore, 3212 tons, now loading a cargo of wheat here for Kiser, Gifford & Co., will be cleared tomorrow with about 221,000 bushels.

HISTORY OF SAILOR BOY

Wrecked Craft Only One Ever Built on Willapa Bay.

(Special to The Journal.)

South Beach, Wash., Oct. 3.—The schooner Sailor Boy, recently ashore on Fanning island and now reported a wreck in Honolulu harbor, was built at this place in 1882, and was the first and last sailing vessel ever built here. She was built by Ed Patterson, a shipbuilder from the state of Maine, then a resident of this place. Her principal owners were Crawford & Co. of San Francisco, but E. C. Mitchell, her first captain, was a resident of this place, owned a share in her, and for several years ran her as a lumber carrier between here and California ports. Old settlers point to the very spot where the wreck from which her name was hauled, and which is now very close to the business center of this city. When the Sailor Boy was built she was considered one of the strongest built and staunchest vessels of her class on this coast.

HANGS HIMSELF AT SEA

Body of Dan McCabe Swings From Masthead of J. W. Clise.

Aberdeen, Wash., Oct. 3.—Captain J. W. Clise, master of the four masted schooner J. W. Clise, reports that one of his able seamen, Dan McCabe, hanged himself from the foremast head about midnight on September 28. McCabe destroyed all personal effects which might lead to his friends being discovered. Little is known about him excepting that he was once in the United States navy. He was buried at sea.

EDITH FLOATED

Big Freighter Rescued From Sand Bar in Sumner Strait.

Seattle, Oct. 3.—Wireless messages to Wrangle, then by cable to this place, announced that with the aid of the United States cable steamship Burnside, the big freighter Edith of the Alaska Steamship company, which went aground on Level island, Sumner strait, was floated at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. The cable ship stood by the stranded vessel for nearly 30 hours.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

To load a cargo of lumber for Mel-

bourne the British steamer Anarty, 3229 tons net, arrived in the Columbia river at 5:45 o'clock this morning from Puget sound. She will take the first of her cargo at Tongue Point and will later come up to the local harbor. She is under charter to J. J. Moore & Co. Laden with a full cargo of getting for the government at Pearl Harbor, Honolulu, the schooner Letitia Bennett, left down from Stella in tow of the Okla-homa this morning.

In ballast the British steamer Bella of Scotland sailed at 10 o'clock this morning for Nanaimo, where she will load a cargo of coal for San Francisco. The great schooner Tillamook and the steamer Alliance will sail tonight, the former for Bandon and Way ports and the latter for Coos Bay and Uruka.

Light vessel No. 88 will probably be lowered from the Oregon drydock this afternoon and she will be placed on her station off the Columbia river October 12, after which relief light vessel No. 88 will be brought in and placed in the drydock for cleaning and painting as she has been treated for the work.

No trace has been found of the two Japanese who deserted from the Japanese steamer Shinkai Maru by swimming ashore near Walker's island Tuesday night. They were K. Baumstein, the cook, and H. Noma, a fireman.

Alma A.—I am certainly not skeptical. I know that a poorly developed bust can be improved by proper treatment. You should not be discouraged by the fact that you are a beginner. 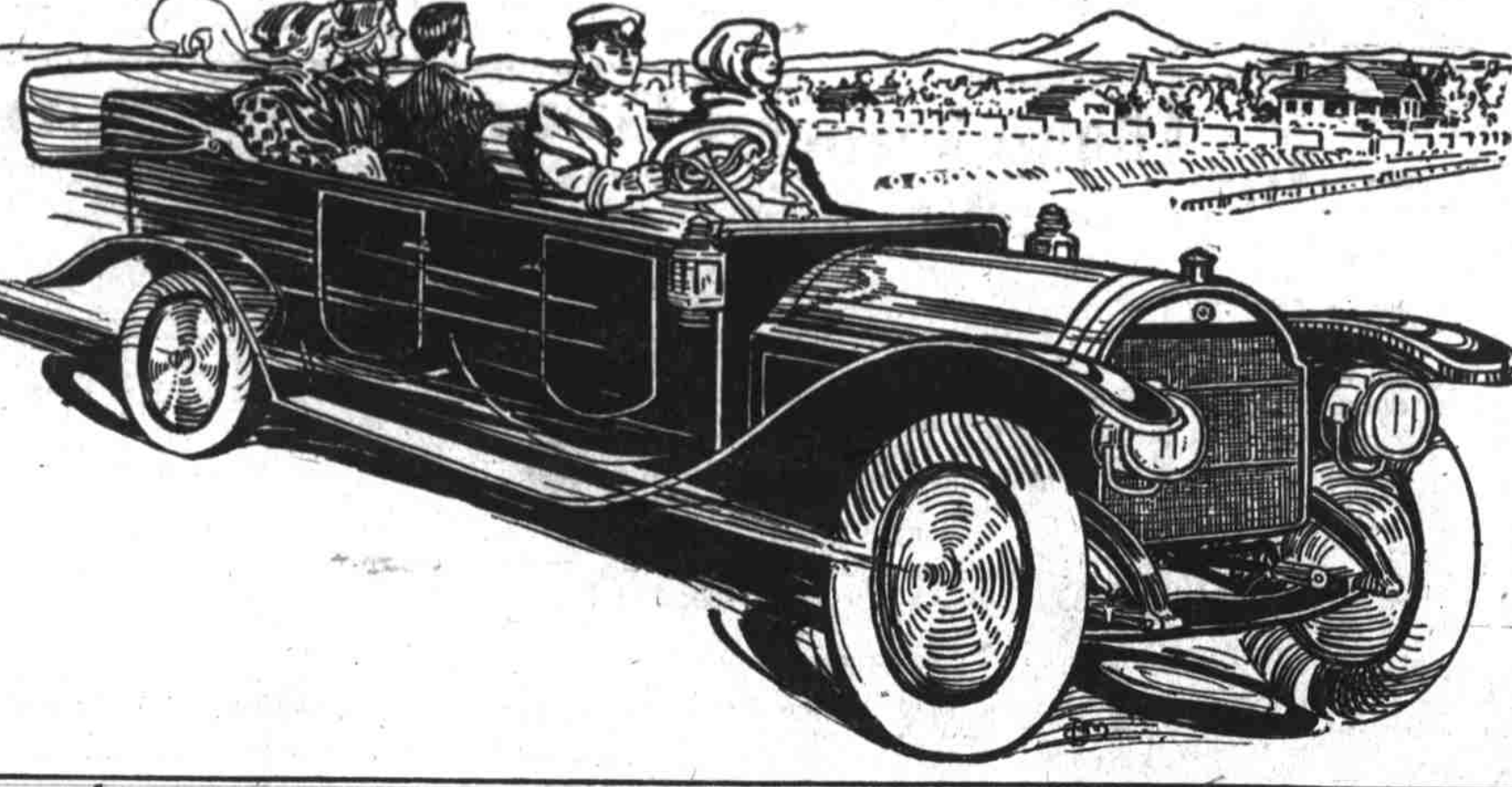
