

ONTARIO-NYSSA CANAL TO BE BUILT THIS FALL

(Special to The Journal.)
 Ontario, Or., Oct. 4.—The contract for the construction of the \$2 million irrigation canal for the Ontario-Nyssa irrigation project has been awarded to the Dick Bros. Construction company of Nyssa. Construction is to commence next week.

This canal will water over 16,000 acres of new land on the upper bench west of Ontario and Nyssa, the water to be supplied from Snake river, about four miles southwest of Nyssa by means of a pumping plant with a capacity of 40,000 feet. The contract for furnishing the power for this plant has already been awarded to the Idaho-Oregon Light & Power company, and the plant is now being installed.

With the completion of the canal everything will be in readiness for the irrigation season of 1912. The system is to be completed and tested this fall.

This project was promoted by local men and was financed by W. P. Davidson, president of the Oregon & Western Colonization company. The company is incorporated as the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation company with headquarters at Ontario. The officers of the company are: A. W. Crow, president; E. M. Greig, vice-president; E. H. Test, secretary; W. J. Douville, treasurer. The four above named with E. J. Deaman, W. J. Finney and Thomas W. Claggett, all local men, constitute the board of directors. The bottle containing the poison was kept on the pantry shelf near some cough medicine she had been using and friends think she made a mistake in the bottle, swallowing enough of the poison to render her unconscious. Dr. Hart entered the room shortly after she fell and summoned a physician in time to save her life.

Mrs. Hart was at one time quite wealthy, but her financial condition is said not to be the most favorable at present. Foreclosure proceedings have been commenced to take from her the home and the last years of property she owns.
