Portland Wholesale Market. Poultry market weak and lower.

Seven cars of bananas arrive. Country dressed pork weaker. Heavy veal moves slowly. Egg market steady. Butter and cheese firm. Grapes plentiful.

Poultry and heavy country dressed pork were weaker today on Front street because of large receipts during the past 24 hours. The chicken market has not been so well supplied for a long time and prices were about the same price today for fowls and spring chickens. Ducks, turkeys, are moving rather slowly at 15 cents for young ones.

LIGHT PORK IN DEMAND

Hogs weighing up to 100 pounds sell regular at \$1.00 on Front street, but \$1.50 is the ruling price for stock running well up to the \$1.50 mark.

VEAL FAIRLY STEADY

The demand for small veal is good but heavy moves rather slowly at quotations that have ruled for a week or more. The receipts yesterday and this morning were quite large.

GRAPES PLENTIFUL

A carload of grapes was delivered on the street this morning. The grapes are in fine condition; in fact as fine as ever received in the local market. Values range from 75 cents to \$1.25.

EGGS AND BUTTER FIRM

The egg and butter markets are firm at quotations and the cheese market is steady. No immediate advances are looked for, however.

VEGETABLES ABUNDANT

Front street is well supplied with vegetables in season. A considerable quantity of cauliflower was brought in this morning.
