

### DEPOSED MANUEL FIGHTS FOR THRONE

#### With Country Stirred to Revolt King Said to Be on Way to Lead.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Eight Portuguese, including Don Alphonso, King Manuel's uncle, today boarded the Oporto express, southbound, outside of Paris. One member of the party who wore a cap and a visor over his face is believed to have been King Manuel on his way to take command of the royalists who are fighting to regain for him his throne.

Vigo, Spain, Oct. 8.—All northern Portugal today is in revolt for the purpose of restoring the deposed King Manuel upon the throne. Repeated rumors of royalist successes are seeping out of the country. Two detachments of royalists, 1000 in each, crossed the border into Portugal yesterday. Captain Comodoro and Machado being in command. Two thousand armed peasants are reported to have joined a force at Azeiteira in a march upon Oporto.

#### White Slave Cases.

The case of C. A. Blake, an alleged "white slave," was postponed from today in the federal court to Friday, the 13th.

In future all Greek and Italian "white slaves," or any other foreigner convicted of "white-slaving," will upon the expiration of their sentences, be deported.

Steve Fougada, who was yesterday sentenced to 10 years at McNeill's island, will be taken to that institution within a day or two. It is planned to send him back to Italy when his term expires.

culating a statute congress enacted to remedy a great evil.

"I am not on that court, but I was once a judge and I love judges and I love courts which stand to their duty. They are my ideals of the law, trying what we shall meet afterward in Heaven under a just God.

#### Reverent Attacks Deeply.

"When a court is doing its duty and trying to teach the law as it should be, to have it condemned, attacked and its motives questioned for mere political purposes without solid ground for such attack goes to my heart and I resent it with deep indignation.

"What distinguished this country from any other is the United States supreme court at Washington that has so often stood between us and errors which might have been committed which would

have been greatly injurious to the country. To turn upon that court, to question its motives, to attack it, is to lay the axe to the root of the tree of civilization.

#### Kindness Feeling Needed.

President Taft, concluding, said: "Only one more word. I want to repeat what I have already said, that we need to cultivate a kinder feeling toward each other. We need to disregard the attacks upon the motives and characters of those exercising responsibility, and to let those attacks pass as unworthy of reading, unworthy of attention, so that the circulation of papers publishing those attacks will not be increased."

"The mark-making business will come, and we shall have a healthier condition wherein we can ascribe each other's proper motives until motives are shown to be improper."

It is believed the president will discuss "international peace" during his trip to the coast. In an effort to make the administration's big policy to follow upon the defeat of reciprocity.

#### Has Won Over Senators.

He believes that the policy can be popularized by reiteration and that by explaining it a two-thirds vote of the senate may be secured to ratify the British and French treaties. The president counts seven senators that he has

won over to support his policies already on this trip.

President Taft made two stops today, two hours here and one hour at Boise. Here the president breakfasted at the Country club, spoke at the state fair, assembled to the Idaho academy, and spoke at the Fossilite auditorium.

Secretary Hillis declined to discuss Senator Snook's remarks at the Fall Lake banquet, in which Hillis was commended for the Republican national chairmanship.

### TAFT, THROUGH COURT, SEEKS AID OF TRUSTS, ASSERTS COMMONER

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 8.—"It would be practically impossible to convict a trust magnate in a criminal court," asserts William Jennings Bryan in the Commonsense. Taking up President Taft's charges, relating to the Supreme court's recent decision relative to the trusts, which Bryan characterizes as a "bluff," Bryan answers through the Commonsense, and challenges the president to give facts regarding the appointment of the supreme court justices. He says: "It would be a reflection upon the president's intelligence to say that he expects the people to take his remarks about the trust decision seriously. He

knows that I only reiterated the criticism contained in the dissenting opinion of Justice Harlan, and what the committee filed three weeks ago, says: "Harlan and Nelson both pointed out that the amendment written into the law by the supreme court, practically nullifies the criminal law."

#### Impossible to Convict.

"Relying upon the authorities cited and I assert again, that it will be found practically impossible to convict a trust magnate in a criminal court."

"How long would it take to secure a final decision in a criminal proceeding against a trust official? It has required four and a half years to secure a judgment against the Standard Oil and it is not known yet whether a reorganization will be any improvement of the original company."

"The president is bluffing. He knows that the question which he raises cannot be settled until after election and then it does not make any difference to him how it is settled. While the trusts sit idle, he won the last presidential election without proposing a remedy for the trusts, and he hopes for the aid of the trusts to win another election by indorsing the retrograde policy of the supreme court."

#### Offers Challenge.

"But, speaking of challenges, here is one for the president: I challenge him

to make public the written and verbal recommendations upon which Chief Justice White was appointed over Justice Harlan and the recommendations, written and verbal, upon which the president appointed the justices whom he places upon the supreme bench."

"I do not know how they stand on the trust question, or was it purely accidental that all his appointees took the trust side of the question?"

"He signed publicity bills requiring publicity of campaign contributions. Why not have a little publicity regarding the influence used in controlling the appointment of federal judges?"

### PARK BOARD RUNS SHORT OF FUNDS

#### Claims Shelved Until Coin Can Be "Borrowed" From the City Council.

The city park board found itself nearly "broke" today when claims for thousands of dollars were presented and had to be shelved until the board can borrow some money from the council. The condition of the park fund is due to the fact that former Mayor Simon refused to let the park board sell any bonds. As a result the money appropriated at the first of the year for maintenance had to be applied on the \$20,000 Terwilliger parkway grading contract.

Money will be available from the sale of \$250,000 of park bonds as soon as the attorneys for the company that purchased the securities can examine and approve them. Meanwhile, the board

must depend on the city council to tide it over.

Half a dozen delegations from as many different sections of the city visited the board in demand parks and playgrounds. They were all sent away with the assurance that it is the policy of the present mayor and board to extend the park system as rapidly as possible and to give the congested portions of the city the first choice.

The board cut down Superintendent Michie's estimate for the year 1912 by refusing to recommend any salary increase.

"We can't raise salaries and buy parks, too," said the mayor.

Superintendent Michie was directed by the board to make an estimate of the cost of putting a fence around Pullman park. The superintendent wants to remove the six from the limited area devoted to them in City park, and he proposes to transfer both the six and the ball fields to Pullman park.

The Oregon Congress of Mothers sent a delegate to ask the board to make playground exhibit at the coming five day meeting of the mothers to be held in the Armory next month. The board will put in a miniature playground and will furnish maps and literature showing what has been accomplished in the way of establishing recreation facilities in Portland.
