

### O. A. C. SENDS EAST FOR INSTRUCTORS

Registration, Already 1093. Is So Great Emergency Call for Help Goes Out.

(Special to The Journal.) Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 5.—The registrar reports a total registration of 1093, an increase of approximately 50 per cent over the registration of last year at this date. The influx of new students is so much greater than was anticipated that it has become necessary to send out emergency calls for new instructors. Little is known in domestic numbers in pursuit of work in domestic science and art that it has been found necessary to commission a new course of the eastern institutions to find two more instructors for this line of work. Other classes are crowded in proportion. One section in history numbers over 75 students and the department of modern languages has 100 more students than expected. The increase seems to be principally in domestic science and art and agriculture, but there is a decided increase in all courses.

### NEW ROSEBURG MAYOR COUNCILMAN 6 YEARS



Joseph Micelli, Elected Monday.

(Special to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., Oct. 5.—Joseph Micelli, who was elected mayor of Roseburg on October 2, will assume the duties of that office on November 1. Mr. Micelli has been a member of the city council for six years, and during that period of time served as chairman of the street committee. During that time he was the directing mind of the city improvement propaganda, involving an aggregate expenditure of over \$200,000. Mr. Micelli is expected to conduct the city's affairs on a conservative and economical basis. He knows the needs of the city minutely; he is conversant with charter procedure to the minimum of detail. He was elected for two years.

At this election the heaviest vote in the history of the city was polled, the total reaching 558, or 157 more than the vote cast in the mayoralty election of 1909.

### LAURIER GOVERNMENT STEPS OUT OF OFFICE

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 5.—After being in power 15 years and three months, the Laurier government this morning stepped out of office and the responsibility of guiding the ship of state were entrusted by his excellency Earl Grey to Robert Laird Borden who has been for the past eleven and a half years trying to lead his party to the goal now achieved.

Mr. Laurier formally tendered to Earl Grey this morning the resignation of his government coupled with the recommendation that Borden be called upon to form a government. The latter was commended by his excellency and formally asked to undertake the burden. Borden accepted and said the new cabinet lists will be submitted to his excellency for approval either on Saturday or Monday.

(Continued from Page One.) mail box a few yards from Fender's tent and while he was present, at about 4 or 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, September 2. That at 6 o'clock Saturday evening, September 2, J. M. Fry, one of Fender's neighbors, passing by, looked into the mail box and saw that it was empty, showing that the Wehrman package must have been removed almost immediately after it was placed in the receptacle.

That Frank J. Wehrman, the husband, called for mail at the Scappoose post office Saturday and found none; that also, he looked into the community mail box that afternoon and saw it was empty.

Fender Is Contradicted. That Fender denies having called for the Apple Valley community mail Monday afternoon, September 4.

That the postoffice clerk at Scappoose declares Fender did call for the community mail Monday; and that John Riley and others, including Charles Lindloff, affirm they received mail from Fender Monday which he said he got from the Scappoose postoffice Monday afternoon.

That while Wehrman had never asked him to call for his mail at the Scappoose postoffice, Fender had called for the mail of others who had also failed to make such a request.

That Wehrman having called for his mail at Scappoose Saturday and finding none, and the postoffice being closed Sunday, the newspaper found in the cabin after the crime must have been gotten from the Scappoose postoffice Monday.

The Borrowed Riley Revolver. That John Riley's 35-caliber revolver, borrowed previously by Fender, was removed from Riley's trunk at some time about the first of the week and later returned, the top of the trunk being cut open; that Fender knew where Riley kept this revolver and knew that Riley would be absent from home.

That Fender, despite his assertion that he had a light burning in his tent all of the early part of Monday evening, was not at home upon that evening; that his light was seen by passer-by.

That Fender failed to milk his cow, feed his calf and wind his clock on Monday evening.

That Fender's face while unmarked Sunday, when he showed, bore scratches

Thursday when officers and reporters talked to him. That Thursday morning, September 7, Fender, while at the corner's postoffice looking at the Wehrman cabin, was nervous and followed the officers about the neighborhood. That Fender's mind ran to porrography. That the murders occurred Monday evening, September 4.
