

PROPOSE PLAN OF BOOSTING LIQUOR LICENSE TO \$1000

Ordinance Ordered Drafted—Maguire's Fight on Combination Houses Is Failure—Keepers Transfer Licenses.

An amendment to the liquor code providing for an increase in the annual license charge for retail liquor dealers will be submitted to the city council at its next meeting, the liquor license committee yesterday ordering the ordinance drafted. It raises the license for saloons from \$500 to \$1000. Councilman Wallace believes the amendment should pass. John Montag was the only member of the committee who did not endorse the measure. He said he wanted more time before committing himself. Councilman James A. Maguire's spectacular crusade against the combination houses of the city and his fight to-night yesterday at the meeting of the liquor license committee. Several of the divalopers aimed at by Maguire outwitted that lawmaker by applying to the committee for transfers of their licenses. These were granted after some parley. Notable among them were Tony Arnaud and Henry Gallet. Maguire failed to show, in a single instance, that the saloons in question were improperly connected with lodging houses above them. The committee room was full of saloonmen and their attorneys. One of the ordinances passed upon by the committee was that revoking the license of the Quella. Fred Sechtem, one of the proprietors of the Quella, appeared before the committee and praised himself warmly. He said he had been identified with the famous home of the crawfish for 18 years and that he had always conducted a model place. Councilman Montag declared that he had known Sechtem a long time and that he was generally regarded among German people as a fine man. Councilman Daly made a motion that the license be revoked. He was seconded by Councilman Clyde. The revocation ordinance was indefinitely postponed, finally. As a result of the license transfers, Tony Arnaud and Henry Gallet have gone out of business and they promise to quit the liquor traffic in Portland. Their successors assured the committee that henceforth the police will have no trouble regulating the old dives. The committee postponed consideration of an application by Frank Minto to transfer his license to a man named Hartel. Minto's place has always been run as a combination house. B. A. Barret, proprietor of the Riche-lieu saloon, protested against his per-

mit being taken away, as contemplated by Councilman Maguire. The committee indefinitely postponed the ordinance revoking Barret's license. George A. Thacher denounced the-act as a phase of the social evil. He said: "Places like Fritz's barroom show and liquor dispensary should not be permitted." He told of seeing cards advertising this place, distributed in small towns throughout the state. About two weeks ago I visited the place. There were 14 women sitting there and about 400 men. One hundred and fifty of these men, I would say were under the age of 25 years." He added: "An ordinance submitted to the committee by Councilman Daly, providing that notification of intended saloon transfers must be given residents of the locality in which the saloon is to be transferred, was recommended for passage."

One Boat Request Except.
Salem, Or., Oct. 4.—That the request of \$10,000 made by the late Maxthalian

Diast of Wagon for the establishment of a Catholic boys school in connection with the inheritance tax, in the case being handled down from the attorney general's office. A request by the same man of \$1000 for the establishment of a public drinking fountain in The Dalles is not accepted, according to the same opinion.
