It is charged that Turkey is not obey ing the rules of international warfare. Italy has released all the Turkish steamers that she selzed in Italian harbors when war was declared, or arriving soon after war. Turkey, on the contrary, has hoisted the Ottoman fing over the Italian steamers Ernesto, Li-ardi and Melsori, which were seized the coast and has remanned along them with Turkish sailors. Italy will protest on the ground that this action is in violation of the convention signed at the close of the Crimean war, which provided that merchant vessels should be given time after hostilities had begun, to reach territorial waters.




