Three, hundred vice presidents of the meeting were grouped around the stage. The armory building seats about 5000 people and there were probably 500 seats unoccupied.

Strikebreakers Come, It is estimated there were between 75 and 100 who were taken into the O.-W. R. & N. shops this morning. There were three carloads of men, but only two were detained here. It is thought the other carload was taken on to Rose.

According to report, the strikebreak-ers are from the Baldwin Locomotive Works of Philadelphia. They arrived at the Albina shops about 9:15, o'clock this morning. The stockade gates were opened and the train was hurried into alized what was happening. The men carried suitcases and overcoats and appeared to be of a better class than any the company has engaged before as strikebreakers.

These men are not counted in the report Issued from Superintendent O'Brien's office today noon, in which announcement is made that 67 additional skilled men have been placed to work since yesterday. The report says that conditions have improved very materially since yesterday. "Ten men who went out on strike at The Dalles returned to work yesterday," says the report. PRESIDENT HAD REFUSED FREEDOM TO FINANCIER

Said Pardon Would Defeat Object of Law and Have Bad Influence.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Oct. 10.—John B. Walsh one time powerful banker and political boss of Chicago, serving a five years' sentence in the federal prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., for misapplying the funds of the Chicago National bank, was paroled today. He will be released The failure in 1305 of Walsh's Chicago

The failure in 1805 of Walsh's Chleago banks resulted in his indictment on 182 counts in January, 1907 he was convicted on 54 counts of having misused the depositors' funds, and on March 18, 1808, began his term at the Leavenworth penitentiary. He is more than 76 years old and is said to be suffering from an incurable malady.

NO EFFORT TO GET CHANGE OF VENUE

Clarence Darrow to Content Himself With Formal Motion for Different Judge, Which Will Be Denied.

(United Press Leased Wire,) Los Angeles, Oct. 10.—There will be no effort made by the attorneys for the McNamara brothers to secure a change of venue for them when their trial is formally moved before Judge Bordwell at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Instead, Clarence S. Darrow, counsel for the accused men, will con-tent himself with a formal motion for a change of judge, which will be forth-with denied. This motion will be on the affidavits already filed by the men and will set forth in legal phraseology why they believe Judge Walter Bord-well to be prejudiced and biased against them.
