

PINCHOT ASSERTS THAT ALASKA IS NOT A GRAB-BAG

Congress Not Favorable to Men Who Would Make a Stake Then Get Away, He Says; Interests Blamed.

Cordova was the only town in Alaska recently visited by Clifford Pinchot and Senator Poindexter where no official recognition was given to them. John A. Lathrop, Washington correspondent of The Journal, who accompanied the Pinchot-Poindexter party and is now in Portland after completing an investigation of disputed problems, brings the story of the Cordova meeting.

It is that town the chamber of commerce, which ordinarily takes the lead in welcoming distinguished visitors, is dominated by the officials of the Alaska syndicate. At a meeting of the chamber some of the citizens moved a call for a public meeting, and it was voted to have one.

Other citizens, not controlled by the syndicate interests, then arranged for a meeting, which was held September 22. The hall was filled with most of the men of the town, and an interesting discussion of Alaskan issues was held.

Pinchot Makes Speech. The feature of the meeting was the address of Mr. Pinchot and his rejoinder to remarks made by Judge C. M. Fraser, in which the former forester gave a pointed rebuke to those who criticize and complain of the past without offering any solution for existing conditions. Pinchot declared for immediate development of resources, but people of Alaska, Senator Poindexter spoke vigorously, warning the people of the necessity of guarding against unregulated monopolies. Pinchot in his address said:

"It is a very peculiar pleasure to meet this gathering, chiefly because I suppose that a very large majority of the men in this room disagree directly with what they suppose I believe and desire.

Appreciates Square Deal. "Let your gentlemen have come here, testifying by your coming that you believe that Senator Poindexter, John Lathrop and I are here in good faith, recognizing that we have a right to our opinions. Our good intentions are recognized by you, just exactly as your good intentions are recognized by us. You give us a square deal by this meeting, and we appreciate it.

"Gentlemen, I have been charged with a good many things in the course of my life, but I want to say to the general public that I am not responsible for regarding the development of Alaska, that I believe I can prove absolutely that that is not true, and that I have proved that it is not true. I have given my reasons in print, and get only a part of them. At any rate, whether you feel that I was responsible or not, I can assure you there was no intention what-

FIVE MILES OF ROAD FINISHED

Progress Made on Wagon Highway Over Mountains North of Mt. Hood.

Work for the season on the wagon road being built across the mountains north of Mount Hood has been completed with the result that five miles of roadway six feet in width have been made and 1 1/2 miles of trail surveyed and made passable. That more work was done is due to the fact that only \$12,000 was appropriated by congress for the construction of the road, and all of this was used up.

The road crosses the Oregon national forest and the work was done under the supervision of the forest service. The road can easily be completed next year to the six foot width if congress will appropriate a sufficient amount of money and it is the hope of the forest service officials and good roads enthusiasts that an appropriation of \$150,000 can be secured and the road maintained to a width of 24 feet.

This is the only road connecting Portland with the Hood River valley, and when it is completed will open a way for travel between Portland and the country east of the mountains. At present it is necessary to ship wagons, buggies and automobiles down the Columbia river, and then up to the Dalles. In the winter the grade is greater than 5 per cent, and the work when completed will never have to be done over. When the survey was made every effort was made to do away with sharp grades. The six foot roadway extends within two miles of the summit of the pass.

The road follows Clear fork of the Sandy river, leaving the Barlow road at the boundary of the forest, where Zigzag first joins the Sandy. At the summit it crosses to West fork of the Hood river, which it follows to the point where it connects with the road from Lost Lake. The roads at both ends need repairing and rebuilding, and efforts are being made to create the cooperation of the good roads people and the counties in which they are situated.

With the completion of this road and the fixing of the roads leading to it, England and Hood River will be joined by one of the finest scenic roads in the country. The forest service men say that the views of the mountains and of the Columbia river basin are not to be surpassed, and predict that it will become one of the most popular thoroughfares for tourists and automobiles in the world when it is completed and becomes known. It will be passable for eight or nine months of the year, as the winter months are too severe and the snow too deep to permit travel.

WESTON-ATHENA ROAD WILL BE FINISHED

to be the only "throughly" highway in the state. Three miles of crushed rock are laid and carefully rolled. A thin surface dressing of earth is then applied. Advance of county bonding agent to this road as an example of what could be done throughout the county were available to issue bonds for \$100,000, as they suggest.

In this instance farmers contributed to the building, and the county crushed, laid and rolled the rock. The rock is four inches deep in the middle and six inches at the edges and the roadway is 14 feet wide.

Colley Injured in Accident. Weston, Or., Oct. 15.—Charles Colley was thrown from his wagon and run over by one wheel while driving out of town along Washington street. A "jump off" had been left at the intersection of this street with the newly-macadamized county road and this caused the accident. Colley sustained two deep wounds in the face. 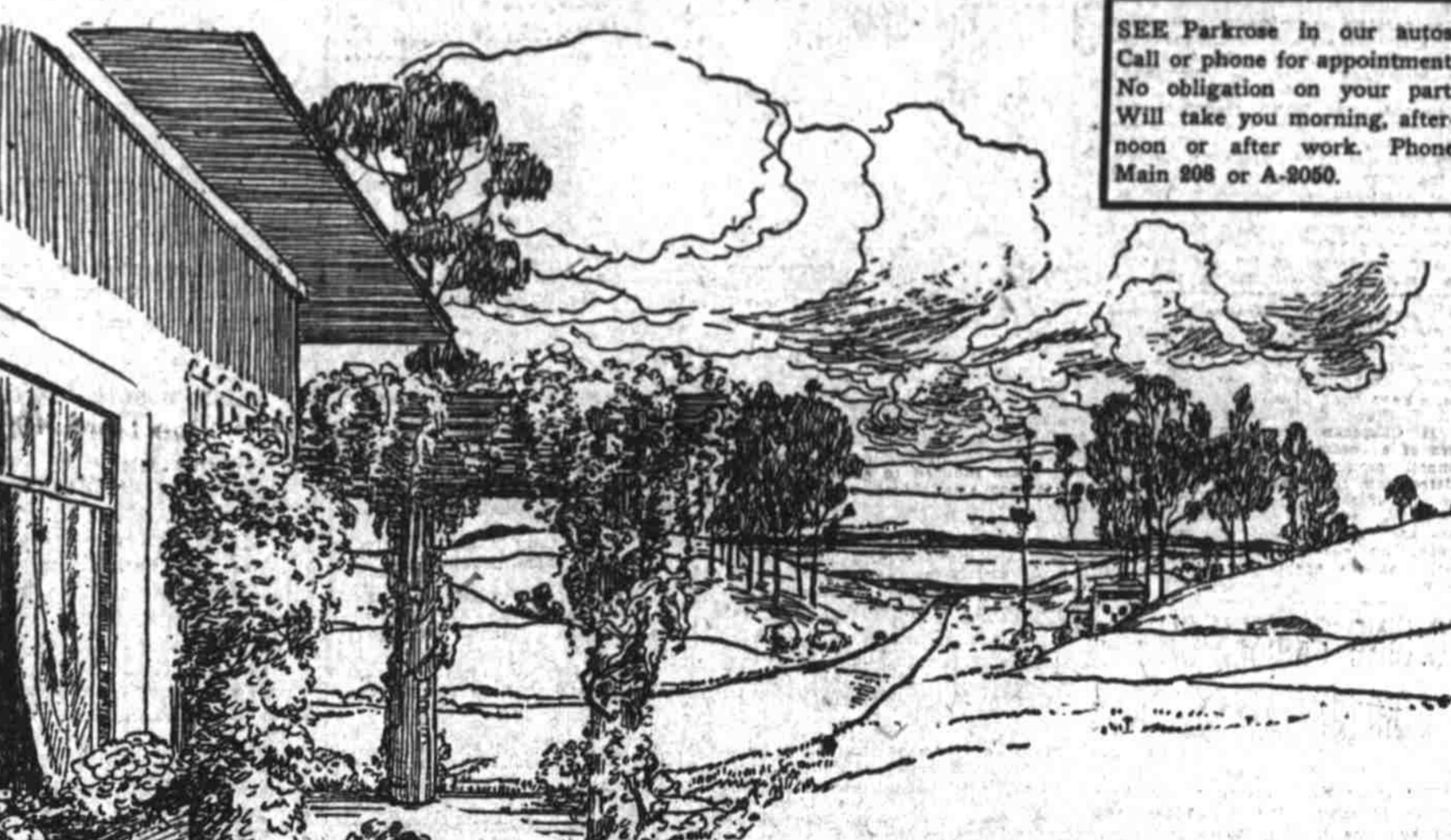
