

# DECLARES M'GINN'S RULING RIDICULOUS

## City Attorney Objects to Finding That Mill Company May Occupy Streets.

Characterizing the decision of Judge McKinnon in the case of the city against the Inman-Putnam Co. as "ridiculous," City Attorney Frank S. Grant said yesterday that the city council should pass an ordinance authorizing him to appeal to the supreme court. An attorney for the company had won the decision first, however, and on motion of Commissioner Wallace the ordinance was referred to the judicial committee, although the city attorney said that the case should go to the higher tribunal as soon as possible.

The Inman-Putnam company has for years occupied with its lumber mill and park a number of important streets on the east side. The company holds access to the river, it is said. Judge McKinnon decided that the streets belong to the city but that the company may continue to occupy them. "Such a decision is ridiculous," says the city attorney.

Strenuous Opposition Follows.

By unanimous vote the council yesterday passed the amendment to the ordinance, placing the case under the supervision of the city health department. City Milk Chemist Cal-

way will prepare at once to make a thorough inspection of all the premises in the city, according to the ordinance and conditions. The ordinance gives the health board power to revoke the license of premises that fail to attain a minimum score of 80 per cent on two successive inspections but more than a month apart.

The council passed an ordinance appropriating \$1500 for the purchase of a five engine fire truck for the city.

An ordinance prohibiting smoking and spitting from leaving fire hydrants without a permit from the fire chief was passed. The ordinance provides a penalty of \$10 for each violation.

Key Fire Alarm Bells.

An ordinance ordering the sale of 1500 sets of dry fire alarm bells was passed and another, requiring gasoline engines to carry mufflers, was also passed.

Final permission was granted the O. W. H. & N. Co. to cross a number of streets on the Peninsula with its Westdale-St. John line.

Councilman Baker introduced a resolution empowering the mayor to appoint a committee to select a site for a public market and to make a report to the council.

An ordinance reducing the annual license fee of hawkers from \$100 to \$100 was introduced and referred to the health committee.

It is probable that Councilman Baker will introduce an ordinance prohibiting smoking on street cars. The councilman asked the city attorney to submit an opinion as to whether such an ordinance would be legal.

W. J. Clemens, a property owner on East Sixth street, which is one of the public thoroughfares that have been closed off by the Inman-Putnam Co., believes that City Attorney Grant should be backed up by the council in his fight to oust the mill company.

"There is some justice in the claim

of the company to the occupancy of streets on which mill buildings have been situated for years," said Mr. Clemens today. "We have no right whatever to fence off East Sixth street and Union avenue. I don't believe Judge McKinnon understood the condition of those streets when he rendered his decision. It is my opinion that the council intends to smother the ordinance authorizing the city attorney to appeal the Inman-Putnam case to the supreme court."

# 17 WORKMEN HURT DAILY IN OREGON

## Reports of Industrial Accidents Show Tremendous Loss of Life and Limb.

State Bureau of the Forestry.

Blaine, Or., Oct. 13.—Fresh indications in the office of State Labor Commissioner G. F. Haff that official will have a sensational and pathetic story to present to the next legislature regarding the extent of the industrial accidents occurring in Oregon. Mr. Haff is throwing out lines into every industrial establishment and plant in the state, and is getting in reports. Since the new law requiring the labor commissioner to collect and keep these reports went into effect June 10, there have been over 1215 persons injured, many fatally.

This law requiring reports from all industrial establishments of the injuries to employees was mainly for the purpose of having data on hand for the next legislature to enable the framers of laws along these lines to know where and to what extent men are being injured. The large roll of the material is especially significant because the results of the summer months of work have been taken and many mills and plants have been shut down during the summer. Also many September reports are not in as yet. It is estimated that by the time

# PROTEST AGAINST OIL TANKS IN SOUTH END

## Delegates of the South Portland League who could attend, a great number of citizens of that section met at a hall at 121 Porter street last night to protest against the locating of oil tanks in South Portland.

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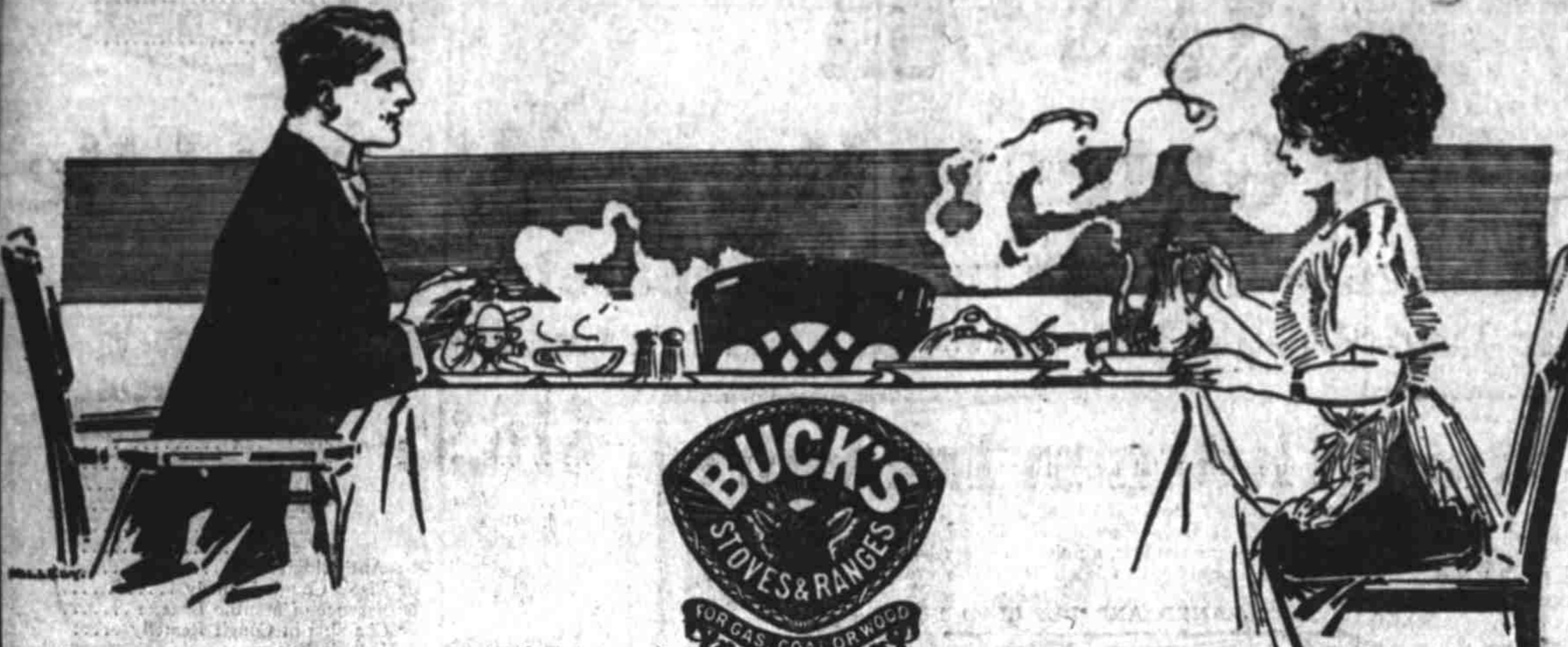
