First Celebration of Kind as Legal Holiday in Oregon Successful.

For the first time in the history of Oregon, Columbus day, in commemora-Christopher Columbus on October 12. less, was celebrated as a legal boilday. Two distinct celebrations were given, one by the Stations of Portland and the other by the Knights of Columbus, both of which were very successful. The Enights of Columbus criebration was more of a private nature.

The Italian observance of the day began with the presentation of the key of the city by Mayor Rushlight to Christopher Columbus (Angelo Cuneo), who accepted it in behalf of Queen Isabella (Florinda Ferretti) and King Perdinand (Pietro Simoni). Prior to the presentation and following it the royal party rode through the city in decorated automobiles.

Big Parade Held.

At 1 p. m. the main event of the day, the great parade under the auspices of the federated Italian societies of the city took place. Grand Marshal Mario G. Montressa lined up the partlefpants in the parade near the Arory and after a slight delay the pa-de was started.
