

HEARD SCREAMS OF DYING WOMAN, TWO ACCUSERS DECLARE

(Continued from Page One.)
Hawkins and Howard were taken before District Attorney Fred W. Wilson at The Dalles, where Hawkins made a statement, corroborated by Howard, in part as follows:
"Statement of Anderson.
"On June 4 we started to walk toward Ardenwald and arrived there that evening. It was understood that we were going up there to rob some houses. We started about 8 o'clock and on the morning of the 5th, about 4 or 5 o'clock we came to the house which we have since learned was the Hill house and Holmberg wanted us to go in and rob the place, but we would not do it, so he said we would go in and rob the house if we would stay outside and watch and see if anybody came along. After he had been in the house for a little while we heard considerable shouting and a woman's voice that sounded as if it were a woman's voice. In about half an hour he came out from the back door. His hands were covered with blood and there was blood on his clothes. He was very much excited and said he had had an awful fight inside and that he had better get away from there in a hurry, so we all started to run and ran about a mile.
"Then we got to the foothills we wandered about all day, and stayed in the hills thereabout three or four days. Several times Holmberg sent Howard after food, telling him if he did not return, or if he brought anybody with him, he would cut my throat. From that time until now Holmberg has kept us with him continually, and threatened to kill us if we left him. About a week or 10 days after June 4, Howard went with him and the three boys to a warehouse, but all the time keeping us with him and threatening to kill us if we undertook to leave him.
"Officer James Anderson, the captor of Holmberg and former guard at the Lincoln rock pile, was accompanied from The Dalles today by Ralph Gibbons, another officer of that town and by Captain Beatty of the detective force of Portland, who went to The Dalles last night. At the depot they were met by Deputy Sheriff Archie Leonard of Sher-

"Wednesday the two boys with Holmberg were caught stealing potatoes on the farm of Mr. Scott, at Rowena. The farmer drove the man off with a shotgun, and took the boys into custody. When they were away from Holmberg they told the farmer they wanted to be brought to town and to be protected from the man. Holmberg followed them to The Dalles, where he was caught by Officer Anderson.
"Then the boys were turned over to the officers, they said they had been traveling with a man who had threatened to kill them, and finally stated that they had been with him in Clack-

some county last June when he tried to rob a house, and they believed he had committed a murder.
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GOOD ROADS MEN TO DRAFT BILLS

All Highway Improvement Bills Indorsed by West Approved by Committee.

Agreeing to draft two convict labor bills for submission to the initiative and approving all the bills indorsed by Governor West's state-wide good roads committee, the directors of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement decided yesterday on a vigorous campaign to secure popular highway legislation at the next election.
"We agreed to draft the convict labor bills," said President Prall of the association this morning. "because we may not always have a governor like Governor West who is so competent to handle the convict labor problem for us. We believe convicts should work upon the roads and a special committee consisting of W. C. Bristol, James Cole and Aman Moore will draft the bills."
To raise funds for the proposed aggressive, popular campaign a special committee on finance was appointed, consisting of Frank C. Nigge, C. S. Jackson and John E. Neill.
