Among other advantages to which the girls have access is a library of more than \$30 volumes, gifts of friends of the home. The girls can have access to the books at any time in the reading rooms but are only allowed to take books away during one hour on Tuesday and Friday nights. Books taken at these times may be kept for two weeks. In the reading rooms are also a dozen of the best periodicals.

During the past year a number of the girls formed a class for the study of German and there have been classes in literature and other subjects at various

Callers at the home are expected to leave at 10 o'clock in the evening and should any girl be out for an evening she must be in by 11 o'clock when the doors are locked. On Wednesday and Friday nights this rule is not in effect and the young lady may remain out until midnight.

The most alarming tendency, in my judgment, so far as our institutions are serned, is the tendency of judicial When men of vast interests are concerned and they cannot get lawmakers to enact amendments to the law as they desire, they spare no effort to get some case before the courts in an effort to have the court construe the constitution and statute to mean what they want It to mean."

Only Justice John Marshall exceeded in length the beach term of Justice Harlan, and had Harlan lived until next spring he would have exceeded Justice Marshall's record.

The highest ambition of Justice Harlan was the chief justiceship. When President Taft appointed Justica White to the office the deceased showed no outward signs of disappointment, but his health began to fall from that time. Justice Harian lived simply and spent the major portion of his time in the open air. In recent years he took enthusiastically to golfing.

Justice Harian was 6 feet 2 inches in height and in his prime weighed 200 pounds. He seemed to weaken from last spring, when he went on a vacation to Murray Bay, Canada. He returned two weeks ago, very weak but not suffering from any special ailment. His physicians explained at the time that his condition was such that any illness which might attack him would make speedy inroads on his constitution. The diagnosis of the physicians was borne out when Justice Harlan became unconscious last night. One son, Richard, who is traveling in France, has not been notified of his father's death.
