

Seven Million Young Salmon Will Be Released in Washington River.

(Spatis) in the Joseph.) White Salaton, Wash. Oct. 15.—Seven million fingerlings, or young salmon, will be dissped into the White Salmon styer to about 60 days. In wire backets containing 25,300 eggs tennersed in continually running apring water, the young salmen are builty batched in the state hatchery at Unforwood. For three weeks balf a dozen men have been seleing the White Salmon river, hauling out mostly Chinoca, which have entered the river in larger number then ever for the purpose of spawning but have been caught in the government trap. The eggs are taken from the female and fartilized by the milk from rise oid males and sarted off to the hairbesty. Hamsheev and Indians vie with each other in obtaining the dead salmen from the fishermen, about it camping on the bank and drying the fish and somking it.

For some weeks selects have been going up the Culumbia even into Idaho by way of the finake river, searching out the gravely spots as spawning grounds, the rocks of the White Salmon iver being a favorite hatching ground.

#### BAY CITY CHINESE FLAUNT NEW FLAG OF REVOLUTIONISTS

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Eagerly buy. ing the currency of New China, in San Francisco's Chinatown, the Chinese here today are going wild with enthusiasm over the prospect of a republican form of government in the Flowery Kingdom. From nearly all the shops and homes not affiliated with the 'big business" interests of the Six Companies flies the new Chinese flag-a red field with a white sun on a field of blue in the upper corner.

Money for the cause of the revolution is coming almost faster than the present treasury facilities of the new republic, located here, are able to care for it. Treasury notes on the Chung Hwa republic, selling at 50 cents on the dollar, and good if the revolution wins, are being sold as rapidly as the Chinese element can gather their money from the banks. Within the last 24 hours more than \$100,000 was raised in this manner, and it is understood that practically the whole expense of the Chinese uprising was financed through

It is the intention of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, provisional president, to move with his cabinet to the seat of war in China within a few days. Dr. Sun has agitated for Chinese freedom during the last 20 years and the present movement is the culmination of his efforts.

#### Unions Prick Up Hars,

Members of the bricklayers' and building trades unions, who have become interested in the case because of what they regard as unfair methods used in taking a fellow worker from the state, will hold a meeting tonight, and are said to plan a reception to Martin if his return is secured.

Governor West gave out a statement reviewing the facts in the case and explaning his action. He said:

The statute says a person charged in any state or territory of the Uni-ted States with treason, felony or other erime, who shall flee from justice and be found in this state must, on demand of the executive authorities of the state or territory from which he fled, be delivered up by the governor of this state to be removed to the state or territory making the demand.

"Leo W. Martin is charged with brutally assaulting his wife who was about to become a mother, and if guilty as charged he should by all means be punished.
