Judge Bronaugh Advises the Framers to Make Haste Slowly.

CLOSING OF GATES WOULD KILL FISH

River Mill Dam Completed, but Small Stream Will Be Allowed to Run for Time.

When the Portland Railway, Light & Power company closes the new Estacada dam at River Mill to form the lake that will furnish water for the new power house, the Clackamas river will run dry for a distance of about four miles down stream, where the furrow is fed by Eagle creek.

"If the gates were closed tight it would take about 24 hours to form the lake," said Mr. Josselyn this morning. "and the river would run perfectly dry for a distance of about four miles. But that would probably cause the death of a great many fish and so we shall wait for a heavy rain and higher water and then allow some of the water to escape through the gates. It will take a little longer to fill the lake, but it will save the fish below the dam."
