

yery earnestly and the work has value. "I have been quite at a loss to understand the motives underneath the attacks reported to have been made on the personnel of the committee of which I am chairman by certain members of the people's committee.
"I do not have the acquaintance of

the gentlemen who are quoted as impugning the sincerity of our work and desire for the commission form of government. I do not know of anything we have done to merit such criticism. We are working altogether without recompense on a task for the public good to which we were appointed by the mayor of this city. We really deserve credit more than censure what we have done, and I am sure that because we are sincerely desirous of changing the present form of government to the commission plan we will be ready to meet the people's committee more than half way in any plan for uniting our work,
