

SALEM COLORED CONGREGATION DECIDES TO DEFY WHITES AND BUILD ITS CHURCH

Salem, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special to The Journal.)—In his efforts to locate a negro church in Salem, Rev. George Raymond, the colored minister, has received in recent months a steady stream of white men to call for the rights. The handful of colored residents of Salem first selected a location for a church in South Salem, where there was an undeveloped section, where the property was owned by a white man, but the proceeds of the sale of that section caused this place to be abandoned.

from the colored land has decided to stand out under the law. While church people have been helping behind the colored people, the administrative action of Salem is standing back of the colored people. J. G. Vogel, a local contractor, says Rev. Mr. Raymond asked that he be a lead of building material into the lot, and that he be allowed to begin the erection of an African Methodist church, but in reality for the purpose of hastening the sale of the property to persons desiring to prevent the erection of the colored church in that vicinity. Vogel also states that Rev. Mr. Raymond intended he could work the same scheme for other parts of Salem, and make more money in this way than he could by preaching and that he would "whack up" with the contractor. Vogel further says that the colored office told him the lot was paid for, but that R. P. Bates, who opened up that addition to the city, told him only \$10 had been paid.
