

FIRST STATE BANK, PHILMATH, SHUTS

Will Probably Reopen in Few Days, Loans Being Good but Slow.

(Special to The Journal.) Corvallis, Or., Oct. 18.—The First State Bank of Philmath failed to open its doors for the transaction of business today.

The state bank examiner has been wired by the officials of the bank to come and take charge of the management of affairs. While there is discussion relative to the condition of the bank's affairs, it is generally considered that it will again open in the next few days.

Loans that are secured but cannot be now converted into ready cash are said to be the cause of the bank's embarrassment. The principal debtors are said to be the Nemo Lumber company and the Philmath sawmills. The bank was organized in 1904 with a capitalization of \$125,000, which has not been increased.

The deposits at the present time aggregate about \$250,000 and the loans amount to \$100,000. The stockholders of the bank are all local people and the officers of the institution are A. J. Williams, president, and James Evans, cashier.

SALMON HATCHERY WILL BE MUCH IMPROVED

(Special to The Journal.) Salem, Or., Oct. 18.—R. J. Shepard, assistant in the office of State Engineer Lewis, returned yesterday afternoon from the salmon hatchery on the MacKenzie river in Lane county, where he ran lines for a new slave pipe in which to bring more water into the hatchery. About 500,000,000 salmon eggs will be gathered this year for shipment to the central hatchery at Bonview. The first shipment of 1,350,000 eggs to the Bonview hatchery was made this week. Superintendent Mat Rickman is making a number of improvements at the hatchery. Some trout for stocking the streams in the vicinity are hatched there.

Leo Martin in Jail to Foil Kidnapers Will Be Formally Discharged Today

L. W. Martin, who was kidnaped from courthouse in Portland early the Denver officer offered \$50 to anyone who would take him across Idaho line. Weinberger arrives just in time to head off deputy sheriff and prisoner.



Final chapters are being added today in the case of Leo W. Martin, who was kidnaped by a Denver deputy sheriff a few days ago from the jurisdiction of Circuit Judge Gatens, and obtained his release at Newport, Wash., on habeas corpus.

Martin will be formally discharged by Judge Gatens this afternoon and his bail returned. Interest will now be turned to the attempt to punish Detectives Maloney and Mallet for their part in assisting in the kidnaping of Martin. Harrison Allen, president of the Multnomah bar association, yesterday afternoon named John C. McCue as special prosecutor and McCue was appointed by Presiding Judge Gatens, in accordance with an arrangement to supplant the district attorney in the proceedings against the detectives.

Mr. McCue said this morning he had not yet accepted the appointment as prosecutor, and will not do so unless he is compensated by the county for his services. The choice of a special prosecutor grew out of Judge Gatens' protest against the appearance of District Attorney Cameron, the judge contending that Cameron was disqualified by reason of his having appeared as attorney

for the detectives earlier in the proceedings. Says Rinko Offered. "Rinko would have gotten away with me across the Idaho line if Constable Weinberger had arrived 10 minutes later than he did," said Martin this morning, discussing his experience at Newport. "The officers had things all framed up to turn him loose and were all against me except Jennings, the chief of police, and he treated me right. Rinko offered me at Newport \$50 after Weinberger arrived if they would take me over the Idaho line, a few hundred yards away, and deliver me to him there."

Martin denies the charges of cruelty made against him by his divorced wife. He says it is not true that he jumped on her. He admits slapping her, but says that was after she kicked him during a domestic melee. He asserts he was justified in obtaining a divorce on the ground of cruelty, declaring she called him vile names, struck him and persisted in associating with improper companions.

Remains in Jail. Martin came to Portland with Constable Weinberger last night. In order to avoid any possibility of being kidnaped a second time, he spent the night at the county jail, and this morning has been constantly with his attorneys. He was not left alone for a moment, a guard being maintained to prevent any kind of a coup until he is formally liberated by the court.

Eugene Brookings, his attorney, has prepared a motion for dismissal of the complaint and all proceedings against Martin, which will be presented to Judge Gatens this afternoon. The motion recites the story of the kidnaping and declares Rinko perpetrated a fraud on the court.

The grand jury will take up the kidnaping charges against the Portland detectives as soon as the special prosecutor is ready to present the evidence. If an indictment results, the cases will be set for trial in the circuit court.

LICENSES REMAIN PRACTICALLY THE SAME AS BEFORE (Continued from Page One.) mon witnesses before the city council or he would have had persons to back up the affidavit made by William West. It seems to me that Councilman Maguire has used all his rights. He has aired his opinions in the public press, in the pulpits of various churches and elsewhere.

Now Lack of Evidence. "Now I have passed the Quille hundreds of times and I saw no violations of the law being committed. Of course, liquor is sold there and the city grants a license for such sale. But I don't see how any councilman can vote to revoke the license on the meager evidence, rather utter lack of evidence submitted by Councilman Maguire. There have been drunken women in the Quille, I presume, just as there have been in other grills, but I don't see why the Quille is singled out."

Following the conclusion of the debate the council, which was sitting as a committee of the whole, voted not to revoke the license. This action was later ratified by the council. The committee of the whole had risen to make its report.

The council also voted to re-refer to the liquor license committee the ordinance revoking Tony Arnold's license. Councilmen Maguire and Clyde, themselves, voted not to revoke the license of E. A. Barrett, owner of the Richelleu saloon. The ordinance revoking this license had been submitted by Councilman Maguire under a misapprehension.

Must Move Saloon. When the ordinance revoking the license of Gallet & Demoux was brought up, it was learned that the council had already transferred the license to E. A. James. The lawmakers, therefore, contented themselves with ordering E. A. James, the new owner, to move the saloon from its present location at Second and Everett streets.

Maguire's ordinance revoking the powers of attorney held by brewers over Portland saloons then came before the council, but Councilman Baker objected to its final consideration after it had been amended on suggestion of Councilman Daly so that it should take effect March 1, 1912, instead of within 30 to 60 days after passage.

During the course of the debate that followed after Councilman Daly's amendment had carried, Councilman Baker, who had presided up to this time, relinquished the chair to Councilman Joy and took the floor on a point of personal privilege.

He declared Councilman Maguire had

been attacked by two motives in seeking the revocation of the powers of attorney.

"One of these," said Councilman Baker, "is revenge on the brewers and the other is gain secondary to the interests of his constituents for reelection. Councilman Maguire was a brewery organizer for 11 years. He was formerly interested in a saloon at Salem and he was dismissed from the employ of the Star and Weirhead breweries here. He knows why I make these statements to show what kind of a man is parading before the public in the guise of a reformer."

Councilman Maguire denied that he had ever been dismissed by the breweries. "I deny any man to look over my record for the past 12 years and find anything of which I am ashamed," he declared. The councilman admitted that he had worked in breweries.
