

### Federated Women Are Told Their Duties as "Citizenesses"

Portland, Oct. 29.—Portland was chosen as the place for the next annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs. This year's session was a successful one yesterday afternoon, followed by a reception and banquet by the ladies of the Eastern Star lodge. Before adjourning the club adopted several resolutions, two of which follow:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed by the president of the state federation, which shall confer with the committees appointed by the various individual clubs, for the purpose of collecting the best Oregon literature, the name of some future date, to be compiled, edited and published by the state federation. Also that a similar committee be appointed for the purpose of collecting Indian lore, legends and historical happenings of Oregon pioneer days.

On Suppression of Bad Shows.  
Resolved, That each club in the state federation appoint a committee or board of censure to watch the moving pictures shown, after a committee for watching the vaudeville and regular theaters, making an effort to suppress any harmful or immoral features being presented, and asking the co-operation of city officials in the matter.

Resolutions were adopted that the legislative committee of the clubs be instructed to present to the next session of the legislature a law favoring sterilization of confirmed criminals, feeble minded, incurably insane and confirmed alcohol and drug users; proposing a net weight amendment clause to the state pure food law to be presented at the next legislature; that the clubs advise the third Sunday in April as state coming up day and that there be created a state board of civic commissioners to examine and issue certificates to teachers.

At the president's annual entertainment the president, Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, delivered her annual address. Mrs. Evans has been president of the federation for six years. She said:

"It is no vain boast to say that Oregon, and what are we going to do with it in the state for the use of her best women? Shall we create the butterfly of fashion, and the price winners for things which, from which our state institutions will recruit their most generous benefactors, unless some suitable specialty, recreation, or social obligation be to make our clubs the very center through which the vital life giving blood of our state shall flow? The time of the times is to get down to the bottom of things. The day for superficial work is over. We no longer care to spend by heading for the stars and in the last and farthest call it a wise dispensation of Providence. We find the polluted stream and cleanse the fountain head.

**Remedy in Removal of Causes.**  
"My conviction has been that while citizenship should give their time and money generally to assisting the suffering and in some cases they should get wisdom and remove the causes, that their children's children may not be confronted by the same problems. Next to our duty to our home is our duty to our town and state, and we can begin this in no more effective way than by putting a question mark to every occasion that is created, which affects social or economic conditions. Discover why it was done and you will

learn one or two things. It is either scarce and made something or it is made and made poor support. In this way we can become a vital factor in every community."

**Voluntarily Loan Report.**  
The reports from the club presidents were read and brought out the fact that all clubs in the federation are active and are accomplishing things in their respective communities that bespeak betterment of conditions. One of the most important among the reports was that from Mrs. Fred Hight on the voluntary loan fund. Since establishing this fund four years ago, loans aggregating \$1225 have been made to 23 deserving young women, materially aiding them in completing their studies. Two of these have already repaid their loans in full and others are making good progress. Many clubs unite in this work and much credit should go to them. Thirty-five clubs in the federation are contributing to this fund and other clubs are preparing to lend their support. The object of this fund is to assist financially worthy and ambitious girls and young women in securing an education and gaining a start in life.

Mrs. O. Howard Pettiger, in her report of the educational committee, urged that every delegate, upon returning home, should take a personal interest in the welfare of the schools in their respective communities.

**On Behalf of a Large Number of Portland Shoppers.** J. Farrington, traffic attorney, is preparing to bring before the Interstate Commerce commission an appeal for suspension of the new rates announced by the transcontinental railroads as a result of the Spokane, Boise and other recent decisions. It is held that the new rates as worked out are discriminatory against Portland.

### TO ASK THAT NEW RATE BE SUSPENDED

"Of particular significance is the increase in Portland on second class rates," said Mr. Farrington this morning. "As the minimum charge on single shipments is based on 100 pounds at second class rate and is at present \$2.60. The proposed advance raises the minimum charge to \$3.00 at St. Louis, \$3.50 at Chicago, \$4.00 at Cin-

Chicago, \$4.50 at St. Paul and \$5.00 at New York.

**Brewers Have Problems.**  
Chicago, Oct. 29.—Prohibition and Prohibitionists came in for criticism at the meeting of the United States Brewers' association here. A number of addresses as well as the reports of officers dealt with the activity in certain states against the liquor business. The problem of hop production, which industry is threatened by the fruit and dairy industries, which are making head so valuable that hop yards are being destroyed, was also seriously considered.
