

INJURIES WEAKEN PACIFIC'S ELEVEN

Best Men Crippled for Tomorrow's Game With Agricultural Team.

Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 24.—Pacific's football prospects are bright last week for the holding of the O. A. C. team to a small score, have within the past few days taken a decided slump.

During a scrimmage last week Turner, left halfback, sustained a badly sprained knee which will keep him out of the game for at least a week more. Ferrin, the middle quarter, whose leadership is the life of the team, has been out because of a bad "charlie horse." However, the big 190 pound guard, has been forced to quit the game on account of parental objections and will be missed to a serious extent. Mayfield, the strength of the right side of the backfield, has not been on account of an attack of tonsillitis. Abraham, who holds down the right end position, has been laid up with a badly twisted ankle. Altogether, the team has had very few workouts this week on account of these injuries. Wegman, a new man, will probably take Weaver's place at guard and Ward, left end, will fill in at left half, while House will take his place at end. The other battered up players will all be in the game tomorrow.

Coach Hard at Work.
Coach Harrington has been hard at work trying to get new players in good shape, and, handicapped as he is, will have his squad in the best possible shape under the circumstances. The average weight of the team will run close to 150 pounds, much lighter than their heavier opponents of the agricultural colleges. Following will be the lineup: Schaller, center; Leonard and Wegman, guards; R. Bryant and Donaldson, tackles; Abraham and House, ends; Ferrin, quarter; Mayfield and Ward, halves, and E. Bryant, fullback.

Pacific's schedule is completed with the exception of the Willamette game. It is the Methodists' turn to play in Forest Grove this year, but they refuse to do so, and have offered the local team a proposition to play at Salem. For two years the game has been at the capital city and Pacific feels that it should be played here according to the established custom. The following games are scheduled: Oregon Agricultural college, October 31, at Corvallis; University of Oregon, November 11, at Eugene; Chemawa Indians, November 17, at Forest Grove.

Bat Nelson Walloped Again.
