Trial Set for Wedding Day. Richeson's trial was set to begin October 31, the day on which he had planned to marry Viola Edmands, the heiress for whose sake the state says

he slew Avis Linnell. The warrant charging first degree murder was issued at 11:25 o'clock by Judge Duff in the criminal court here, following the positive identification of Richeson by William Mahanthe, Newton druggist, as the man who bought cyanide from him last Saturday, "I have irrefutable evidence that

Richeson bought cyanide in Newton, said Chief Inspector Dugan, "I also have a witness who swears he saw Miss Linnell and Richeson together at the South station on Friday evening."

The witness referred to by Dugan is George Baker of Hyannis, another suburb, who is a brakeman on the New Haven road. Baker said that the couple greeted each other cordially and left the station together.
