They settled in La Grande where Mr. Kineey built the first two story frame house which became known everywhere as a refuge for all travelers. At that time there were but few cabins at La Grande,

Mr. Kinney was the first treasurer of Union county which extended from The Dalles to the Snake river and was ap-pointed by Governor Gibbs. He also started the first Sunday school in La Grande and was a member of the first lodge of L. O. O. F. in the Grande Ronds valley.

Mrs. Kinacy is survived by her widower, 50 years of age, 8 children, all residents of Portland, 15 grandchildren and 3 greatgrandchildren. All were with her at the time of her death.
