WASHINGTON PUTS UP 42 TO O SCORE

Scores Almost at Will on Little Academy Team in Long Halves.

Washington's heavy football eleven ran away with the Portland academy team yesterday afternoon on Astoria Field and defeated them by the score of 42 to 0. The academy eleven did not stand a show with the big varsity players, although their work in various parts of the game was brilliant.

Neelson, the big fullback of the Washington high team, was the star of the game. The big fellow went through the second half with ease and his goal and place kicking was a feature.

Edwards, the Washington quarterback, was full of fighting spirit throughout the game and deserves a good deal of credit for his fine work. Max and White also made valuable contributions for the Washington team, while Beckert and Norman did fine work with their tackle though tackle runs.

Washington scored the first points in the opening quarter when Neelson made a beautiful place kick from the 25-yard line. The ball was kicked off again and shortly the Washington boys worked the pigskin within half a yard of the goal line and shoved White over for the first touchdown. The triple forward pass brought the ball again within the half yard goal mark. Neelson kicked goal, making the score 6 to 0 for the first quarter.

Washington recovered the ball in the second quarter after P. A. failed to make a punting attempt and Neelson tried for a place kick from the 25-yard line, but the ball went wide of the goal posts.

P. A. put the ball in play by kicking from the 25-yard line, with line smashing for yard gains. The Washington boys worked the ball near the goal line and sent White over for another touchdown and Neelson kicked goal. Washington kicked off again and after the first scrimmage recovered the ball on a fumble and scored another touchdown on a touchdown and Neelson was there with another goal. The score for the first half was 21 to 0.

In the second half the Washington boys piled up the same number of points, making the final score 42 to 0. The Washington team played the game in a fine manner and deserved to win, although they outweighed the P. A. lads a number of pounds. Superior team work enabled them to make a big score, although the regulation 15-minute halves gave them time to increase their points.

Quarterback Bean and Cobb did the best playing for the P. A. eleven. Although Bean is a little man he showed class throughout the season, and with a heavier squad he would be a star player.

The Jefferson high school next Thursday afternoon and the game should be one of the best played this season, as both teams have a fine chance at the championship.
