

### CITY SHOULD OWN OCEAN FREIGHTER, SAYS J. T. FLYNN

#### Noted Coast Engineer Suggests Possibility of Combination of Rates Which Would Leave City Helpless.

In his efforts to get in touch with the sentiment of the people of Oregon in regard to Senator Aldrich's suggested plan for a coastwise freighter, Senator Jonathan Bourne has sent a copy of the revised edition of the Aldrich plan and a letter of inquiry to every grand, commercial organization and banking institution in the state. His letter reads as follows:

"I enclose herewith copy of the revised edition of Senator Aldrich's suggested plan for coastwise legislation. It would respectfully suggest the desirability of calling a meeting of your organization for the purpose of reading and discussing the plan submitted, determining which features, if any, your members approve and which they disapprove, together with such suggestions as a majority of the members of your organization may determine upon. Personally, I should be grateful for the conclusions you arrive at and suggest that you have your secretary favor such member of the Oregon delegation with a copy of the same."

"I presume that the committee citizens, or aggregate of a number of citizens, possess more ability, experience and less selfishness than any individual possibly can. Hence, my adoption of this method of trying to obtain the views of the committee citizens is meant to benefit me in my study of the subject. In the wisdom of this action I am sure you will concur."

### BOURNE OPINES GRANGE ON ALDRICH METHOD

"I am not advocating municipal ownership of a steamship except in case of emergency. I hope the time will not come when it is necessary to resort to this remedy. The best way to guard against such a necessity is to place in the hands of the city the power of owning the steamer. It is purely a protective measure, but none the less necessary. Used or unused, it will be a freight regulator, because of the ability to raise rates."

"Cities of the Pacific coast must be prepared to take advantage of their opportunities. The vast expenditure for the Panama canal and the sums spent in opening waterways and docks will be to little purpose if a combination of unlimited resources is formed and deprives the coast of the benefit of reasonable water rates. The commercial life of these cities is at stake."

**Big Saving Seen.**

"A ship built to carry 10,000 or 15,000 tons of freight, making six trips a year to New York, would transport 60,000 tons in a year. If the ship owned by the city effected a saving of 20 per cent, this would be \$1,200,000 saved in one year. Probably the saving would be much more than that. A ship of this tonnage could be built for \$1,500,000 and would be good for 40 years."

"In her new charter Los Angeles is given authority to own and operate a freight carrier, so she will be prepared for any contingency. Portland should have the same power, and as you are now framing a new charter, this should not be overlooked."

Mr. Flynn, who lived in Portland 20 years ago, and is familiar with Oregon waterways, has been inspecting the Columbia river bar. He declares there is no engineering difficulty in placing 25 to 40 feet of water on the bar.

### SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO USE FULL FORCE

#### Strikers Say Railroad Plans to Put Full Crew in Sacramento Shops.

(United Press Special Wire.)

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 23.—Southern Pacific officials here, the strikers allege, have made arrangements to place a full working force in the boiler and machine shops next Monday. From Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha, they say, boilermakers and machinists will be brought here to fill strikers' places.

The first train load of strikers' places is expected Monday and will be housed in outfit cars brought to the local yards from various sections and shunted to side tracks near the river front.

Company officials refuse to discuss the matter.

One of the large car shops has been fitted up as a dining room, tables and seats to accommodate 200 men at a meal having been placed. At present about 100 strikers are being housed and fed on the company's property and a guard of 150 watchmen is being retained.

Considerable trouble is being experienced by the company in keeping trains on time "over the hill" between Sacramento and Truckee. The heavy locomotives are beginning to break down owing to lack of repairs.

Only 50 boilermakers are at work, where a force of 150 men is needed to keep the engines in condition.

### PRESENT LIQUOR CODE REMAINS IN EFFECT

"I move that we give the brewery interests a vote of appreciation," said Councilman Will H. Daily this morning after the council had, by a vote of 9 to 8, indefinitely postponed an ordinance revoking all powers of attorney held by brewers in connection with the liquor code.

The ordinance caused a heated debate at the session of the council two weeks ago. At that time Councilman Daily thought he had succeeded in amending the ordinance so that it should become effective, if passed, March 1, 1912. The councilman found out today, however, that his amendment had not been inserted in the ordinance.

Councilman Baker moved to postpone consideration of it indefinitely. Some of the councilmen, thinking Daily's proposed amendment had carried, were willing to see the ordinance passed and for that reason voted against Baker's motion. The result was a tie vote of 7 to 7. Hence Mayor Hushlight could be called on to decide the tie. Councilman Wallace and Montag asked permission to change their votes, they having voted not to kill the ordinance, believing the Daily amendment had been incorporated. This broke the tie, and made the vote 8 to 5 for postponement, which action leaves the present liquor code still in effect. The code provides that power of attorney shall cease to exist after December 31, 1912.

### ARIZONA SELECTS STATE CANDIDATES

#### Race for Governor Will Be Between Hunt, Democrat, and Wells, Republican.

Phoenix, Ariz., Oct. 23.—George W. P. Hunt, Democrat, of Globe, president of the constitutional convention, and Judge E. W. Wells, Republican, of Prescott, will fight it out at the general election December 13 for the honor of being the first governor of the new state of Arizona. This was made certain today when returns from almost every county in the state indicated that Hunt's majority over Thomas F. Woodin of Florence will run into the thousands over George U. Young, progressive, of Prescott.

Early today the leading candidates for the Democratic senatorial nomination were Henry F. Ashurst, Mark Smith and Eugene S. Ives. It is generally believed here that Ashurst and Smith will be the nominees.

The counting of the votes is very slow and it will be late in the day before anything definite on the senatorial situation or the majority of state officers can be obtained.

### PROMISE MUST BE KEPT, SAYS MAYOR

#### Commission Plan Must Be Submitted in January, He Declares.

Since Mayor Hushlight appeared before the Simon charter committee last night asking that there be no doubt of submitting the commission plan at a special election next January and was assured by Chairman Brown of the Simon committee that it could not be done, the people's charter committee has been seriously considering the possibility that the charter draft will be the only one to appear on the ballot at that time.

"I want to see the promise made to the people kept," said Mayor Hushlight this morning. "The promise was submitted in January next. I do not care which charter draft is submitted so that it is a good one. Of course the decision rests upon the council to make."

Chairman A. E. Clark of the people's committee said this morning that the people's charter draft would be ready for submission through initiative petition or action by council at the time of the proposed special election, January 9, 1912.

"If we can get together with the Simon committee so that but one draft satisfactory to all can be submitted, I will be very glad," said Mr. Clark.

"But whether the Simon committee shows disposition to take action looking to a unifying of effort the people's committee will have completed its work, will have a commission plan ready for popular vote in plenty of time to favor the pledge made to the people."

### COPPER SPOON IN DISH APPLE SAUCE POISONS

Saul and Herman Butner, a cook at 347 Albi street, where the poisoned food was served. Quick work on the part of the police, who pressed the police auto into service, saved the lives of both.

The first intimation of trouble was when Patrolman Saul telephoned from Twenty-third and Savier streets for help, stating that he was deathly sick, and while he was talking over the telephone his words became fainter and fainter and he finally fell to the street in convulsions.

He was carried into a nearby restaurant, where he was found when the police auto arrived, and he was taken at once to the office of Dr. Elgier, where his stomach was pumped out.

The police auto had just returned to the station when a call came to headquarters that Herman Butner, the cook at the restaurant, was also suffering from potomac poisoning, and the police auto was used to rush him to St. Vincent's hospital.

Captain Keller ordered the restaurant food examined, and it was found that a copper spoon in the apple sauce was responsible, and the spoon was ordered destroyed and the apple sauce thrown out.
