

COUNCIL PARDONS GIRL FROM PRISON ON MOTHER'S PLEA

Erring Daughter is Spared Serving Rest of Her Sentence for Moral Delinquency—Other Council News.

The old story of a mother's devotion to an erring daughter led to a resolution in the city council yesterday afternoon when the legislative body for the first time in its history pardoned its patronizing young girl prisoner by finding a young girl from the city jail.

Woman's Sad Story.

He had to wait before he could open the door. She was on watch for the mayor to proceed to his office for the young girl. Secretary McCord glanced the story from her. He found that she works from 4:30 in the evening until nearly 4 the next morning in the laundry department of a large hotel. The mother had gone without sleep almost the days and nights in an effort to quiet aid for the daughter. She saw an article in The Journal, in which City Attorney Grant's opinion declaring that the city council and not the mayor's story, laid the case before the council with the result that the daughter was let out of jail yesterday afternoon and given into the fold keeping of the anxious parent.

Anti-Smoking Ordinance.

The council passed an ordinance prohibiting smoking on streets. The measure provides a penalty of \$50 fine or five days in jail for violation. Hereafter the street or company has tried to enforce an anti-smoking rule, but this has met with opposition. The new ordinance was fathered by Councilman Baker at the request of various women's clubs.

An ordinance amending the vice commission appropriation ordinance was passed. This gives the chairman and secretary of the commission the authority to use the \$150 appropriation as they see fit, making quarterly reports of expenditures to the council.

PLAN POTATO SHOW FOR CROOK COUNTY

Redmond Commercial Club Fathers Scheme to Entice the Farmers.

Redmond, Or., Oct. 25.—A potato show will be held here November 2, the day the O-W. M. & N. demonstration train is to be here. It promises to be one of the big events in this section of the county. The affair will be held under the auspices of the Redmond Commercial club. It is proposed to make this an annual show. Carl Gray, president of the Oregon Truck railroad, had sent \$25 to be given as a prize for the best individual exhibit of potatoes, and the association and business men of this city have contributed other prizes. These will be first and second prizes for the best individual display, the best single potato, the best dozen potatoes and the best bushel of potatoes. Competition at the show is open to all growers in Crook county and it is expected that many fine exhibits will be shown. The potato crop in Crook county this season is the best ever raised and farmers are entering into the contest with spirit.

Redmond School Crowded.

Redmond, Or., Oct. 25.—The school attendance in three lines was great as it was last season. The new school building is pretty well occupied now and later in the season it is expected that the rooms will be uncomfortably filled. School book dealers sold out the first day of school, owing to the largely increased attendance. Many farmers are moving into the city to school their children for the winter. The directors in enlarging the schoolhouse thought they had made their plans large enough, but from the present indications another schoolhouse will have to be built next year.

PASCO PEOPLE REFUSE TO BUY WATER PLANT

Pasco, Wash., Oct. 25.—The proposition to purchase the water system and plant of the Pacific Power and Light company under condemnation proceedings and authorizing the city council to issue \$50,000 bonds to raise funds for the same, paying not to exceed \$45,000 for the system, which was submitted to the voters of Pasco today was lost by a majority of six. The vote was 265 against and 255 for the proposition. The plant which it was proposed to pay \$45,000 for was recently appraised by an engineer employed by the city at \$25,000.

General Noble 80 Years Old.

St. Louis, Oct. 25.—General John W. Noble, of this city, who was secretary of the interior under President Benjamin Harrison, reached his eightieth birthday anniversary today and was the recipient of congratulations from many friends. General Noble is a native of Ohio and a graduate of Yale. During the war he served with the Third Iowa cavalry and was made brevet brigadier general. With the exception of his service in the Harrison cabinet he has devoted nearly the whole of his life since the close of the war to his extensive law practice in this city.

WOOLGROWERS TO EDUCATE PEOPLE
