

RELIGIOUS FORCES HOLD CONFERENCE

Consider Plan of Retaining Stimulus Resulting From Gipsy Smith Meetings.

A plan to conserve the religious stimulus resulting from the Gipsy Smith Meetings was launched at a meeting of the committee of the Men and Religion Forward Movement in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium last night.

The finance budget showed necessity for 1932 to carry on the work in Portland. F. N. Clark and O. C. Bortmyer presented plans and methods for getting the money.

Dr. J. W. McDougall, district superintendent of the Methodist church and chairman of the executive committee, said that a great opportunity had been offered by the religious work he had grown out of the great need.

The way in which the new movement is being received among the churches was described by speakers as having an influence that grips the loyalty and work-impulse of all but the religiously lazy.

Richard H. Perkins, executive secretary of the movement, told how in this modern day business interests were being used for the good of the church.

SELLING ARMY "DUDS" WORRIES UNCLE SAMUEL

Washington, Oct. 24.—One of the most vexatious problems confronted in the United States army is how to stop the practice of soldiers selling or otherwise disposing of their clothing, according to Brigadier General Crowder, inspector general, who has discussed the question in his annual report, just made public.

There were last year more than 200 trials for this offense alone in the army. It is most prevalent in the Philippines, where there are men who make regular practice of buying the heavy clothing brought by soldiers arriving from the states.

EACH SIDE FIRM IN THE HARRIMAN LINE STRIKE
