

### PLAYERS' UNION IS LATEST THING

#### New Job Being Arranged for John M. Ward, Old-time Tossler.

Philadelphia, Oct. 27.—A baseball players' union is in the making and John M. Ward, lawyer and former baseball star of the New York club, is to be the president of the new organization, according to a report circulated here today. It is said players of many of the National and American league clubs have signified their willingness to join the new movement, which is intended to secure better rights for the major league players.

Problems arising constantly to the game have emphasized the necessity of union on the part of the players, who are at the mercy of the club owners and the powers that be in organized baseball. The players assert that under the present order of things they have "no recourse but to submit to the edicts of the club owners and the national commission, who like the laws of Moses and Perseus, can not be changed."

The proposed union will have a constitution and by-laws and will be organized with the intention of competing with the big men in the game for bettering present conditions in the world of baseball.

Elevation of Ward to the presidency of the proposed union would place him in a position to deal on equal terms with Ben Johnson, president of the American league, and give him a chance to air some of the schemes he has been planning. One thing this union will attempt to enforce, it is said, is a uniformity of laws governing the game and players. Some players are not treated properly by their managers and, it is declared, there should be some redress.

### SERIOUS CHARGE RESTS AGAINST AGED DOCTOR

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 27.—Having made a confession in the presence of 17 year old Annie Regis during her last hour at the county hospital that he had performed a criminal operation resulting in her death, Dr. J. S. Herndon is today in the county jail, charged with murder. In her statement Miss Regis said that Thomas J. Hunt, of Oak Park, a school fellow to whom she was engaged to be married, was responsible for her condition, but that she held him blameless. She had scarcely finished her statement when she died.

Herndon, who is 63 years old and married, came here about three years ago from Washington.

Medford, Or., Oct. 27.—Dr. J. S. Herndon, who was arrested at Sacramento this morning charged with the murder of Annie Regis, following her death as the result of a criminal operation, for a number of years was a resident of Ashland, Or., where he conducted a hospital. Dr. Herndon was well known in this city. Several ugly stories were recalled concerning him and his practice in Ashland today by Ashland residents when they were informed of his arrest at Sacramento. Herndon has a wife and three children at present living at Ashland.

Dr. F. G. Swendsburg, a physician of Ashland formerly associated with Dr. Herndon in conducting the hospital at Ashland, stated this morning that he had severed partnership with him, owing to Dr. Herndon's frequent acceptance of such cases. He expressed little surprise when told of the case. Herndon came to Ashland from Cle Elum, Wash.

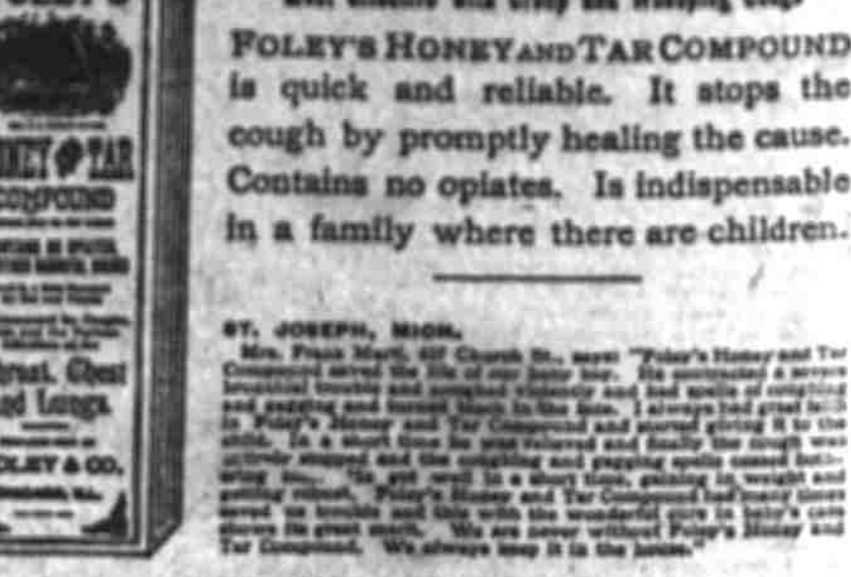
