Given two opposing lines of practically equal strength, it will be almost impossible to block kicks. Since the three inside men are now permitted to lock legs, one set of forewards must be inmensely superior to the other to get through he time to "gum up" a kirking play. Add two good tackies, and the chances of interfering with a post are not one-tenth as good as they were in

the old days. Even after the ball is birked the advantage is with the kicker. Unless the leather strikes the ground within the neutral sone a player on the kicking side may not be legitimately interfered with until he has gone 20 yards bayond the line of scrimmage. This rule in it-self makes clean handling of kicked balls imperative, with the loss of it as the most probable alternative.

A team presenting a strong front is almost certain then, to got its kicks away in good order. The rules give the ends a clear track down the field until they have traveled so far fliat only the opposing backs stand between them and the runner. Under such ctrcumstances as these running back will be a much more difficult stunt than it has ever been before and, as a natural conse-quence, far more speciacular and thril-
