Michael Shurkey's Funeral—The funeral of Michael J. Shurkey, who died early Saturday night, October 28, at his home near Oregon City, 1940 on a stroke of pneumonia after an illness of 12 days, will be held at 2:30 tomorrow morning at the home of H. F. Strayer, 109 Hancock street. Church services will be held at the Holy Rosary church, West Third and Chalmers streets, at 9 o'clock. The interment will be in the Mount Calvary cemetery. Mr. Shurkey was born in Lebanon county, Ireland, 15 years ago. When 5 years old he with his parents moved to Canada, where he lived until he was 11 years old. From Canada he moved to Portland, where he lived for a number of years. The remaining years of his life were spent on the farm near Oregon City. The deceased leaves a widow and the following children: Edward M., Margaret P., John J., of Portland, Sister M. Laurence, of the Dominican convent, San Jose; Mrs. Elizabeth Hansen of Portland, and Mrs. Sarah A. Strayer of Portland.

Missing Boy Discovered—The Southern Pacific company has had two detectives in the field in the vicinity of Newburg, searching for some boys who the other day placed a bomb of old single iron on the company's track. A train struck the obstruction, fortunately without damage, but it is said the engineer was badly frightened as a result of the explosion. It was reported that the boys if found will probably only be given a sound lecture.

Wife to Recover—John Egan, the Bulgarian, who last evening severely wounded John Flora at 787 Nicolai street, was arraigned before Judge Taswell this morning on a charge of assault with intent to kill, but waived examination and was held over to the grand jury. His victim is reported to be improving and death is not feared, although on Saturday night it was believed he was fatally injured. Both men refuse to acknowledge that a 12-year-old girl was the cause of the trouble, but others familiar with the case declare that Egan's familiarity with a neighbor's child is responsible.

Beaten by Thugs—While J. Simmons of 573 Third street, was returning to his home from the theatre last evening, three ruffians attacked him at Third and Main streets and in the scuffle the man was severely beaten. After he escaped from his assailants he discovered that his watch was missing and the affair was reported to the police. One of the trio was recognized by Simmons and the police are seeking him.

Want "Owl" Car Service—Believing that Portland has reached that state of its development where an "owl" car service is necessary on the principal street railway lines, Councilman Tom N. Menka will interview President Josephyn of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company this afternoon with the object of obtaining from the railway official assurance that the company will install an all-night service.

Shop Foreman Falls Dead—Tom McCarrick, aged 47 years, for some time the foreman at the Albina railroad shops, fell dead at his home at 758 East Burnside street, last evening, and in view of the trouble with strikers recently, Patrolman Larry Evans was sent to investigate the affair. Dr. Tremblay was present when Evans arrived, however, and stated that death was due to paralysis of the heart.

Thieves Steal Trousers—R. C. Scott of 324 Fourth street reported to the police this morning that prowlers entered his room and stole a pair of trousers containing two purses in which was all the money he possessed. The man neglected to report how much money was taken.

Fear Wife Is Suicide—An unidentified man reported to the harbor-master that his wife was missing and that he thought she might have been the one supposed to have jumped from the Steel bridge Wednesday evening.
