

TO PAVE STREETS UNDER OLD PLAN

Property Owners' Wishes Cause Board to Rescind Its Action—Mayor Warns.

Despite vigorous objection on the part of C. A. Siglow, the city engineer, the board of public works yesterday rescinded its action of last Friday in rejecting bids for four small street improvements. The entire cost of the improvements is under \$1,000 and the contractors have declared that they will finish the work within two months. A great majority of the property owners affected are desirous that the improvements be laid before the advent of the next season.

Mr. Siglow, who is a member of the street committee of the board, protested against the rescinding of the contracts on the ground that bids for the work had been submitted under the old paving law. He said he thought no contracts should be let except in accordance with the law which he submitted to the committee paving amendment adopted at the last general election.

Chairman Fitzgerald of the street committee and H. G. Foster of the same committee had previously to Friday's meeting, put in a minority report favoring the acceptance of the bids. They themselves voted to reject this report, doing so under a misapprehension. Mr. Fitzgerald explained this to the board yesterday and asked that the bids be accepted. In view of the fact that there is an insistent demand on the part of property owners that the streets in question be improved at once, the board so ordered. Mr. Fitzgerald's request, but filed the time limit on each of the several contracts at two months and provided for a possibly heavy enough to facilitate the contracts if they are not completed on time.

CHARTER FRAMERS PLAN FOR CITY PROSECUTOR

The appointing of a city prosecutor with one or more deputies to give full time to police court cases was approved by the Simon charter committee meeting last night at the city hall.
