

START CAMPAIGN FOR PARK BONDS; NEED \$2,000,000

Mayor Ruslight Tells Large Delegation That If System Is Extended, More Coin Will Be Necessary.

A campaign for a bond issue of \$2,000,000 for additions to the park system was launched at yesterday's meeting of the park board when Mayor Ruslight told a number of large delegates from various sections of the city that if they want more parks they will have to get busy and vote more bonds.

For a long time the present park board has favored another park bond issue. Superintendent E. T. Mignola in his annual report, will strongly recommend the acquisition of additional park sites. When expenditures already incurred have been taken into consideration, the cost of the last remaining bond of \$2,000,000 left and if Portland is to keep anywhere near the mark set for it by Seattle and other cities of the same size the recommendation of the mayor, the park board and the park superintendent will have to be carried out.

The park board held the same opinion during the administration of Mayor Snow, but the policy of that executive was negative with respect to bond sales. He not only would not countenance a proposition for another bond issue, but he would not even allow the bonds that had already been voted to be sold. These bonds have since been sold by Mayor Ruslight, but their purchasing power had greatly decreased owing to the rapid growth in realty values.

Mayor Ruslight has for some time been quietly advocating another bond issue and the park board has taken up the matter. It is probable that the board will ask the city council to put the proposed issue up to the people at the special election in January.

At yesterday's meeting of the board

The room was crowded by people who came to see that parks be established in a dozen or more different localities. Mayor Ruslight's announcement to show that they would have to vote more bonds before they could get more parks was the signal for a general discussion in which the delegates, the board members and the mayor took part. The discussion was so general that neither bond issue could be voted.

NEW YORK BEHIND PORTLAND SOME WAYS

"New York, old and grand a city as it is, is modern in many ways, but old-fashioned too in many respects. For instance, you still see there the old horse car, old-fashioned buses and old-fashioned cars," says C. J. They have no vestibules and the doors are always open so that the draft sweeps through it all times, and the weather is not as balmy as in Oregon, either. Frisborough had an old-fashioned system and the same may be said of many other large cities. I noticed particularly that Portland is well advertised in the east."

Mr. Franklin read a paper of two-car train operation for city and suburban travel that created much interest, with the result that Mr. Franklin's ideas as worked out here were approved. Another very interesting paper read was furnished by Claim Agent Hornton of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, on the subject of instructing children how to avoid accidents.

Mr. Franklin was accompanied on the trip by his wife and little baby. They also visited Mr. Franklin's home in Brooklyn and as a result Miss Evelyn Franklin is now visiting with her brother and sister-in-law here. Miss Franklin decided to come west as she was at the depot in New York to bid goodbye to the visitors from Portland. Remarking jokingly that she had a good notion to go along, she was quickly persuaded and without further preparation secured a ticket and came on.
