

### FEAR DEFEAT FOR COMMISSION FORM

#### Inability of People's and Simon Committees to Agree May Cause Failure.

The people's charter committee at last night's meeting indicated a conviction of some of its members that agreement with the Simon committee is not possible by accepting the plan for a new form of commission plan charter for the ballot for popular approval or rejection.

The many who believe that a division of the people's committee will not be made for consideration of the plan for a new form of commission plan charter in a similar action has not been taken by the Simon committee and the mayor has been given the opportunity of following his plan for appointing the 12 members of the official committee, making thus a total membership of 24.

The work of the people's committee which was commenced the first week of last August was completed last night with the exception of some charter "tag ends" that are to be reviewed at a final meeting next Monday evening.

**Amendments Referred.**  
All the commission plan amendments covering the wide field of municipal administration applied to commission government have been referred to the committee on codification and revision which consists of Richard W. Montague, W. C. Newlow, Judge Henry E. Mullins, Isaac West and A. E. Clark.

A final vote taken last night settled the election dispute that has been going between members of the people's committee for several months. It was decided that the elimination primary and the preferential scheme as methods of election shall be submitted to the people as charter amendments independent of the commission plan proper, so that the people may say without endangering the charter, which method they like best.

It was also voted to separate the firemen's and police relief funds in accordance with a petition submitted by the firemen.

#### Board of Trustees.

The city treasurer and a member of the commission will constitute a board of trustees that will give a fireman full pay for six months from the time he is injured in service so that he cannot work, and after that time, if he still be incapacitated, will pay him \$12 a month. City Attorney Harris was appointed a committee of one last night to ask the council for an extension of the time appointed for a commission plan election from January 3 to February 13 or 15.

#### Commencing at the opening sections of the commission plan draft, the Simon committee last night reviewed uncompleted portions of its work, reaching the section on streets after several hours of patient work. Another meeting is to be held tonight. No mention of consolidation or independent submitting of charter drafts was made by the Simon committee at last night's meeting.

#### Baldwin Builds Block.

### SHALL BOSTON PAY DOCKAGE?

#### Dock Commission Asks Compensation—City Attorney to Give Opinion.

Shall the British Boston pay dockage to the city of Portland? This question was the subject of discussion at yesterday's meeting of the dock commission. So absorbing was the argument that only by accident was it remembered just at adjournment, to ask the status of the dock bonds to be issued for the purpose of installing Portland's \$1,500,000 public docks system.

The dock commission has not been asked to give an opinion on the matter. It is the city attorney's duty to give an opinion on the matter.

**Money Is Needed.**  
"Frequently the harbor is full of ships from foreign ports seeking dockage while waiting cargo," said Harbor Master Spuler. "In my opinion, the Jefferson street levee should be kept open for these vessels in the 50. We need the money."

George Cornwall, member of the commission, urged leniency for the Boston, since she has been loaned to the state and is used almost exclusively by naval militia vessels from the city.

Chairman Mulkey of the dock commission, reported that the money for the first \$50,000 issue of dock bonds had not yet been received through the Portland Trust company from eastern buyers.

**To Make Bindings.**  
He explained that the buyers had asked for more data and that immediately E. C. Gilmer, secretary of the commission, had caused a wire to be sent asking the nature of data desired. This message had not yet been answered, said Mr. Mulkey, and it had become a question as to whether the attorneys had used the request for data as a means for covering up the fact that they had not yet gotten to an examination of data first submitted, or whether they were waiting for the supreme court of

### LOAN COMPANY'S HEAD COMPROMISES BANK CASE

#### (Special to The Journal.) Bellingham, Wash., Nov. 3.—By paying \$10,000 to Receiver Albert B. Head of the Home Security Savings bank, which closed its doors in March, Charles C. Olson, president of the Home Loan company, has obtained discharge of the \$10,000 damages suit against him.

By agreeing to pay \$10,000 Olson does not admit that he defrauded the wrecked bank. He offered the settlement following negotiations between the lawyers representing both sides of the case in order to avoid further litigation.

The receiver's steel action for \$100,000 against Olson and the Home Loan company was based on the ground that Olson had obtained discharge of the \$10,000 damages suit against him.

The inmates of the county farm are being moved from the old quarters to the new farm east of the city this week. The patients confined in the open air sanitarium were moved yesterday, and the other confined patients will be moved today. All equipment and paraphernalia used at the old farm, that can be of use in the new one is also being moved. Much of the moving was done by chartering a car from the street railway company.

As soon as the inmates are permanently located in their quarters, and the site of building with them, the city will proceed with an expansion of the farm.
