

SCARCITY OF CARS WORRIES EASTERN OREGON SHIPPERS

Complaints to State Commission Indicate Greatest Shortage Since 1907; Railway Blames Coal Car Demand.

(Special to The Journal.)
Salem, Nov. 3.—Complaints received by the railway commission from eastern Oregon indicate a more acute situation in respect to car shortage than has existed since the great shortage of 1907, which was general in its nature. These complaints come from the territory between the mouth of the Blue Mountains and Huntington. The Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company admit the shortage and declare their inability to cope with the situation. They claim the shortage is due to the demand for coal cars and to inability to get supplies from the Oregon Short Line, their sister connection. Flat cars and stock cars seem to be plentiful but box cars are as scarce as they were four years ago. The railroad officials claim the limited car supply is being used to the best advantage to avoid discrimination. The commission is advising complainants how to proceed under the reciprocal demurrage law, designed to apply in cases of this character.

Under this law, orders for cars must be placed in writing with the agent nearest the point where the cars are to be supplied. If the railroad does not then supply the cars within the time provided by law, it becomes liable to applicants in the sum of \$1 a day per car until supplied, and also for actual damages suffered by the applicant and attorney's fees for recovery of the same. This reciprocal demurrage law has been upheld by the state supreme court and applies to interstate as well as state traffic. A case involving this law was carried up to the supreme court of the United States where it is now pending.

The commission has also advised complainants to keep careful records of damages suffered and complete records of when applications were filed.

through which the wind blows the stinking gases back through the city to escape through vents in the manholes. This is the real explanation of why the residence sections have experienced such a malodorous visitation during the present year.

Mayor Investigates.
Mayor Rushlight, City Health Officer Wheeler and City Harbormaster Speiser made an inspection of the sewer on both sides in the patrol launch Eider. "These conditions are certainly a grave menace to the city from a health view point," declared Dr. Wheeler, after the inspection had been made. "The banks of the river should be bulkheaded and the sewage conducted clear out into the river so that it will leave the tubes under water. The floats and stems that litter both shores and offer nourishment to hordes of rats should be immediately cleaned out."

Major Rushlight said that the only permanent solution of the sewage problem would be the laying of a great lateral trunk sewer down Fourth street, emptying at a point as far down the river as would be possible with the contour of the country.

WAR DEPARTMENT FAVORS SYSTEM OF EFFICIENCY

Washington, Nov. 3.—The war department has approved "scientific shop management." A report on betterment of the service was made yesterday by Brigadier-General William M. Crozier, showing how the new system would reduce expenses and increase the efficiency of men employed by the government.

The report shows that the principles of the "Taylor system" are not new and that in many of its details it has been tried for many years. The basic idea is the application of educated and scientifically trained intelligence to the operations of men which were formerly considered either as being of small importance or as belonging entirely to the practice of a trade.

Using a long stick with a wire hook attached, the prowlers reached in through doors which they opened with pass keys and pulled the trousers belonging to the sleepers into the hall where the pockets were rifled. J. E. Dunlop reports that his trousers were found on a back stairway with \$1.50 missing. These were pulled out from under the head of the sleeper.

Alex Peres and Nick Klips of the same house report that their key was pushed out and the door unlocked and \$43 stolen from their pockets.

Minor reports of stolen clothes and tools were also received.

SAYS HE WOULD KILL PATROLMAN GRISIM

Sergeant Lyons arrested a desperate man at 1 o'clock this morning on the steel bridge who had threatened to kill police headquarters his avowed intention of killing Policeman Charles R. Grisim whom he had started out to find.

Sergeant Lyons went to the steel bridge where he encountered his man and arrested him.

Grisim appeared at police headquarters a short time later and filed charges against the man, accusing him of insanity. The man was taken to the county jail this morning for examination as to his sanity.

S. G. Deane, another insane man, was arrested by Patrolman Litherland this morning at the R. & M. restaurant where he had gone in and attempted to order the cooks and waiters around. He declared that he had just received \$200 from John O. Rockefeller, had purchased the restaurant for \$75,000 and the Hotel Portland and the Oregonian building for \$500,000 and declared he owned the Liberty bell. He was also taken to the county jail.

Woolworth, one of the founders of the famous five and ten cent stores, announced today the formation of a \$25,000,000 corporation, merging 500 numerous small concerns, including his own, into the largest business of Woolworth & Co. The corporation will be the greatest string of

five and ten cent stores in the world and will be known as the F. W. Woolworth company. It is understood that Goldman, Sachs & Co., and Lehman Brothers of New York, and the firm of Kislavich, Stone & Co., of London, will acquire interests in the securities of the new combine when organization is completed.

F. W. Woolworth is an American, although he controls large interests in England. His fortune is enormous. He personally owns 100 five and ten cent stores, besides supplementary stores located at Lewistown, Idaho, and Denver, Colo. Twenty of his stores are located in England.
