

CONGRESS TO FIND GOOD HOMES FOR NEEDY CHILDREN

Department Added to Oregon Body, Which Objects to Sending Tots to Institutions—Need Parental Care.

A new department was added to the work of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, which is holding its annual convention at the Armory in connection with the first child welfare exhibit ever shown west of Chicago...

Speakers pointed out the pity of having to send children to institutions, where they are entirely away from parental love, to be reared. They thought that efforts should be made to place as many of them in good homes as possible.

A resolution was passed by the delegates making this work a regular department of the work of the Mothers' congress and a special committee will be appointed to conduct it.

Constantinople, Nov. 2.—Former Grand Vizier Haake Bey, if impeached for the ineffective defense of Tripoli, will protect himself with the declaration that the German ambassador repeatedly assured him that Italy would not send a regiment or a ship to Africa, and for that reason his cabinet did not think it necessary that troops or war material be sent to Tripoli.

Milan, Nov. 2.—(Via Frontier.)—Following an Italian refusal of a second Turkish demand for the surrender of the city of Tripoli, 51,000 Turks, under the command of Reschad Bey, today are bombarding the city preparatory to a general assault.

Frankfurt, Germany, Nov. 2.—"The American and Austrian consulates have been removed to the interior of the city because of danger of their old locations," says a dispatch from Tripoli to the Frankfurter Zeitung.

Mason to defend her.

Eleanor Mason, or Mrs. Krueger, told the grand jury the story of Cohen wanting her to employ Attorney Silverman.

Judge William N. Gatens of the Circuit court was unanimously re-elected judge of the juvenile court department at noon today by the other judges of the circuit court.

The judge reappointed the old officers in the probation work. Samuel D. White is chief officer, and Emma Butler has charge of the girls' work. Judge Gatens brought up the question of raising the salary of the grand jury bailiff. The judge suggested this be raised from \$70 to \$80 a month.

(United Press Leased Wire.)—Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 2.—President Franklin of the Boilermakers' union today ordered a strike of all the boilermakers on the Big Four, Lake Erie & Western, Indiana Southern, Indiana Harbor and Belt railroads, to begin at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Young Woman Tries to Commit Suicide. An attempt was made early today by a pretty 20-year-old girl, whose name is believed to be Morris, to commit suicide at Thirty-second and Belmont street by drinking the contents of a vial of carbolic acid because a man said to be one of the proprietors of a barber shop refused to marry her when she appealed to him to do so this morning.

Corvallis Bootlegger Caught After Weeks. (Special to The Journal.)—Corvallis, Or., Nov. 2.—E. Barton was arrested for bootlegging last night and pleading guilty, was fined \$200. Officers have been watching him for several weeks as they suspected that he had been selling liquor in the vicinity. As he could not pay all the fine, he is serving out part of the sentence in jail.

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MORE ARRESTS IN CENSUS FRAUDS CASES ARE MADE

Three Accused of Inducing Enumerators to Falsify Returns, Two Taken into Custody—Released on Bonds.

With the indictments by the United States grand jury of Fred H. Bayler, John F. O'Connor and one other, who has not yet been arrested, the work of the United States census fraud specialists in Portland has been completed.

Prosecution of the enumerators and others alleged to have made false returns has been in the hands of Special Assistant to the Attorney General C. A. Newton.

From the fact that in spite of the number of men that have been working and the time spent, but eight indictments have been made by the federal grand jury, it is believed the sensational charges of wholesale padding made by census bureaus on employees at the time the investigation was begun were without much foundation.

In Tacoma Mr. Newton and his assistants secured the indictment of 25 enumerators and six others, including the supervisor of the census, for conspiracy. In Seattle three were indicted: In Spokane, two; in Walla Walla, one; in Hellingham, one; in Aberdeen, one; in Klamath, one; and seven in Montana cities.

Mr. Newton and several of his force will remain in Portland pending the trials of the accused men.
