Mary. Their teachers at Sunday school substituted these names for their more difficult Oriental names and they gladly accepted them. The family tries to follow modern methods at all times and have much fun trying to break the young wife of Ye from her Asiatic habits. Ye went back to China a short time ago and brought back the wife.

PORTLAND HOME PHONE NOT SOLD

Deal on San Francisco Bay Does Not Involve Local Company.

(Quoted From Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Word of the absorption of the Bay Cities Home Telephone & Telegraph company by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company is expected here momentarily from New York. The buying firm is a branch of the American Telephone & Telegraph company.

President H. T. Scott of the Pacific company is in conference with President Theodore Vail of the American company and Henry E. Huntington, J. & Torrence and A. B. Case of the Home company in New York. It is not yet known whether the Los Angeles concern is included in the deal. The Home company has an authorized stock issue of \$30,000,000 and a bond issue for a similar sum. None of the securities are listed. About \$5,000,000 has been spent by the company in construction work on both sides of the bay here.

Officials of the local Home Telephone company say that there is no movement.

England Advised to Send Troops.
Believing the situation throughout China is critical and that grave disorders will accompany the overthrow of the Manchurian dynasty, Admiral Widdow, commanding the British naval forces, today advised England to send troops to China. It is understood he also suggested that each world power send 1500 soldiers here at once.

Reports today from Peking declare the capital to be in a state of anarchy and it is feared that conditions are rapidly reaching such a state that foreign interference will be necessary to preserve the lives and property of Europeans.
