The need of more room at the city jail, and at the Linnton rockpile, is emphasized by a report made to the chief today by Acting Captain Harry Riley to the effect that since October 13 and up till yesterday, 60 men who had been given rockpile sentences had been compelled to serve their time in the city jail and that there now are 18 men waiting in the city jail to be taken to the rockpile. Superintendent Andy Vaughn of the Linnton rockpile, has reported that he can only accommodate men from the city jail as fast as he releases others from the rockpile, there being no room for more than 65 or 70 men there at one time.
