The government has sent another expert to the Vale oil fields to investi-gate conditions according to George H. The opening evening of the conven-Mills, of Vale, who is at the Oregon tion will be devoted to a reception and hotel, having arrived from the eastern part of the state yesterday. R. R. Matthews last week spent three days looking over the prospects for oil and gas near Vale and Ontario, as the representative of the government geological survey. He expressed himself as well pleased with the work being done.

"The well at Ontario is down more than 4000 feet and plans are for drilling until oil is struck," said Mr. Milia "Plenty of gas has been tapped, but the company started after oil and will not stop until its experts are fully satisfied that gas and not oil underlies the Ontario fields. Gas is being used for lighting although the piping is faulty
